

## Dental Lab. Tech. Instructor, Student Help Out At Area Clinic

An instructor and a student from Pamlico Community College's new Dental Laboratory Technology program volunteered at the recent Mission of Mercy free dental clinic in New Bern. Instructor Kathy Nicodemus and first-year student Patricia Willis worked a

day at the event, which was held Oct. 27 and 28 at The Epiphany School of Global Studies. The event provided free dental care to more than

700 low-income patients, including about 85 men and women who received dentures, partials or other prostheses. Nicodemus and Willis helped pour and trim models for many of those prostheses, among other

"I absolutely did enjoy helping," said Willis. "The experience was very rewarding in different aspects for now and in the future."

The Mission of Mercy free dental clinics are outreach projects of the N.C. Dental Society. They are staffed by volunteers, including dentists, hygienists, assistants, lab techs and others.

The New Bern operation featured more than 70 dental chairs and a mobile X-ray trailer. Marines stationed nearby also were on hand to help.

Willis said the clinic gave her an opportunity to take the information she had learned in Nicodemus' class and put it to good use.

"Pouring models was one of the first hands-on things I learned in class," she said. "The hands-on experience definitely gave me a different prospective into the field of study. The experience has made me want to pursue becoming a dental laboratory technician even more, and I'm so eager to learn everything

I need to know and start a career."

Willis added that she was impressed by the pace of activity at the clinic and enjoyed seeing her instructor thrive in it.

"I enjoyed the whole thing, but working beside Ms. Kathy (Nicodemus) was definitely at the top of the list," she said. "While she was in a comfort

zone for herself, it was a new thing for me, and she helped me through everything and made sure I felt comfortable in such a fast-paced, first-time experi-

PCC President Dr. Jim Ross was pleased to learn that a PCC student and instructor had volunteered at the clinic and commended them for caring enough to

"When we launched the Dental Laboratory Technology program, we knew it had the potential to improve people's lives," he said. "This Mission of Mercy clinic is a perfect illustration of how a PCC program can provide training that enables students to start careers and to make a positive difference for people in our region."

Nicodemus was glad she and Willis got a chance to take part in the effort.

"Overall it is a fantastic organization and a very rewarding experience for all involved," she said.







KERNERSVILLE-- The Pamlico County Cross Country team concluded their season on Saturday at the North Carolina High School Athletic Association State Championship. The male team placed 13th overall in the state. Cameron Lee, Eastern Region individual female representative, placed 37th overall as an

individual.

"It's obvious the state meet was a departure from normal, both in terms of the level of competition and the number of competitors," said Head Coach Paul Delamar. "Overall, I was satisfied with the effort our kids gave. There's little to complain about as a coach. In this case they were," said Delamar.

Leading the way for the Canes was senior Alden Sylvester with a 5K time of 18:26. Sylvester had the best performance of his high school career on the biggest stage. "I really try not to think about the race or the

people. Once I get my breathing in check I just let my body take over until I hit the finish line," said Sylvester. This performance came as no surprise to Delamar. After the race, Delamar said, "Alden has always had his best races at big meets at the end of the season; we've come to expect that of him. He's going to be a great runner at UNC-Pembroke."

Coming in behind Sylvester, were seniors Derrick Columbus and Malik Barber with times of 19:30 and 19:32. "I've never seen three better senior leaders than Alden Sylvester, Malik Barber, and Derrick Columbus. There aren't words to describe how important they've been," said

Rounding out the Canes top seven were David Rice with a time of 19:38, Cooper Metts with a

time of 19:49, Josiah Stephen with a time of 20:04, and Jahmere Miller with a time of 20:19.

"Cameron Lee has been solid all year, and Saturday was no different. She ran a smart race, and she took the hills well. I could see her taking as much as a minute off her 5K time between now and next year. She's a phenomenal athlete with great

> potential," said Delamar. Lee qualified as an

individual for the State Championship meet at the Regional Championship two Saturday's ago. "It meant a lot for me to qualify for states in my first year at Pamlico. It was the culmination of a lot of hard work," said Lee. Lee crossed the finish line with a 5K time of 22:13.

Reflecting on the season Delamar said, "There are too many bright spots to mention. This team has been rewarding as a coach. Imagine how fortunate we've been to have a group of kids totally dedicated to each other and to their team goals. I'll never

have a tighter, more enjoyable team; they spoiled me." Expanding on the same idea, Sylvester said, "We win, lose, and hurt together."

The Hurricanes Cross Country program looks to recruit future runners and expand upon last year's successes next season.



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
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## Stampeding Bull Market May Slow Down ... So Be Prepared

As you know, we've been enjoying a long period of steadily rising stock prices. Of course, this bull market won't last forever - and when it does start losing steam, you, as an investor, need

Before we look at how you can ready yourself for a new phase in the investment environment, let's consider some facts about the current situ-

• Length - This bull market, which began in 2009, is the second-oldest in the past 100 years - and it's about twice as long as the average bull market.

• Strength – Since the start of this long rally, the stock market has produced an average annualized gain of 15.5% per year.

While these figures are impressive, they aren't necessarily predictive - so how much longer can this bull market continue to "stampede"? No one can say for sure, but there's no mandatory expiration date for bull markets - in fact, they don't generally die of old age, but typically expire either because of a recession or the bursting of a bubble, such as the "dot.com" bubble of 2000 or the housing bubble of 2007. And right now, most market experts don't see either event on the near-term horizon.

Still, this doesn't mean you should necessarily expect an uninterrupted streak of big gains. Some signs point to greater market volatility and lower returns. To navigate this changing landscape, think about these suggestions:

• Consider rebalancing your portfolio. If appropriate, you may want to rebalance your investment mix to ensure you have a reasonable percentage of stocks - to help provide the growth you need to achieve

your goals - and enough fixed-income vehicles, such as bonds, to help reduce your portfolio's vulnerability to market volatility and potential short-term downturns.

• Look beyond U.S. borders. At any given time, U.S. stocks may be doing well, while international stocks are slumping – and vice versa. So, when volatility hits the U.S. markets – as it surely will, at some time – you can help reduce the impact on your portfolio if you also own some international equities. Keep in mind, though, that international investments bring some specific risks, such as currency fluctuations and foreign political and economic events.

• Develop a strategy. You may want to work with a financial professional to identify a strategy to cope with a more turbulent investment atmosphere. Such a strategy can keep you from overreacting to market downturns and possibly even help you capitalize on shortterm pullbacks. You could invest systematically by putting the same amount of money in the same investments each month. When prices go up, your investment dollars will buy fewer shares, and when prices drop, you'll buy more shares. And the more shares you own, the greater your potential for accumulation. However, this strategy, sometimes known as dollar cost averaging, won't guarantee a profit or protect against all losses, and you need to be willing to keep investing when share prices are declining.

During a raging bull market, it's not all that hard for anyone to invest successfully. But it becomes more challenging when the inevitable volatility and market downturns appear. Making the moves described above can help you keep moving toward your goals - even when the "bull" has taken a breather.

## Legislation May Bring More Health Services To Poor Areas

RALEIGH — The infant mortality rate remains frustratingly high in North Carolina compared to the national average, a report from the state Department of Health and Human Services finds.

Loosening state regulations on medical practice may enable more health care providers to offer services where they're needed most.

North Carolina reported 7.2 deaths per 1,000 live births in 2016, ranking it seventh from the bottom among states. The most recent data for the U.S. average is from 2015 and shows 5.9 deaths per 1,000

Last year, on average 331 babies were born each day in the Tar Heel State; two each day didn't survive.

"We need to do more to address the true determinants of health, if we want to see improvements," Dr. Elizabeth Tilson, state health director and chief medical officer, stated in a press release. "Our goal is to lower the infant mortality rate for all babies in North Carolina and decrease disparities within our populations."

A scarcity of physicians in low-income, rural areas is one of the problems. Legislation in the General Assembly would ease the restrictions on some medical providers, including certified nurse-midwives, which should make their services more available in areas where obstetricians are hard to find.

The Child Fatality Task Force held its annual presentation at the Legislative Building, which included an update on infant mortality rates Oct. 25. It detailed the racial disparities still persistent in the

Black infants were 2.7 times more likely to die before their first birthday compared to white babies, and the racial disparities are widening. The infant mortality rate for black babies increased by 7.2 percent from 2015 to 2016. Similarly, the rate increased by 11 percent for Hispanic infants. The mortality rate for white infants decreased by 12.3 percent during the same period.

The leading causes of death for infants in 2016 were prematurity and low-birth weight, a category comprising 20.6 percent of all infant deaths, according to data from N.C. DHHS. Congenital malformations, deformations, and chromosomal abnormalities were the second most common cause of death -19 percent of all infant deaths.

Poverty is just one factor contributing to higher infant mortality rates, the Child Fatality Task Force stated.

"The numbers (of infant mortality) are greatest in the eastern part of the state," Karen McLeod, chair of the Child Fatality Task Force, told North Carolina Health News. "There seems to be a correlation around poverty in that area as it relates to death. This is something we really need to look at and investigate further and see what kind of interventions can be put in place to move North Carolina to a better

A shortage of physicians hurts the eastern part of the state, McLeod said during the infant mortality presentation. According to North Carolina Health News, McLeod said, women often have to travel outside their home counties to see an obstetrician.

The N.C. Perinatal Health Strategic Plan 2020, launched in 2016, is seeking solutions that would lower the infant mortality rate and end the racial and income disparities. Through a 12-point plan, N.C. DHHS, along with perinatal health experts, intend to address not only the infant mortality rate but also the health of the parents.

A legislative fix is also in the works with House Bill 88, otherwise known as the Modernize Nursing Practice Act. The bill has stalled in the House Health Committee.

H.B. 88 would reduce regulations and allow Advanced Practice Registered Nurses the ability to practice without direct physician supervision in some circumstances. Certified nurse-midwives are just one type of APRNs who benefit by H.B. 88, says the North Carolina Nursing Association.

"The fact that so many mothers in rural areas are struggling to see any provider due to the status quo is unconscionable," said Tina Gordon, the chief executive officer of the North Carolina Nurses Association. "Passing House Bill 88 would remove the outdated regulations that prevent many Clinical Nurse Midwives from providing this essential care in parts of the state that need it most."



Maybe, just maybe, you all inspired me to try hosting another PEP Retreat next year. Jennifer Smart

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

## How To Show Your Appreciation To Members Of The Military

a soldier to be a keynote speaker.

## It's Trout Time!!



By Stuart Creighton It's trout time on the Neuse River! The specks are making their annual move into the creeks, and the bite is turning on! While you are working the creek shores, you will also find flounder, puppy drum, stripers, and white perch scattered in with the speckled trout, so don't overlook them. Deep grassy points are great spots to search for trout as are spots with structure such as docks, rocks, and blowdowns. During this time of year, trout feed aggressively, and will hit several different baits. MR-17's and other twitchbaits are extremely popular this time of year. However, don't forget that jigged soft plastics, popping corks, and topwater baits will all draw strikes.

Trout are heavily pressured this time of year, so if you can find some clean water that has not been worked over by netters or other anglers, take the time to fish it. You never know, you might just find the next honey hole!!

This is also the time of year to go out in the ocean to chase albies. If you can find a school of them working bait, or feasting off of the cull from a shrimp trawler, you are in for a SERIOUS FIGHT! While you are out cruising for those albacore, keep your eyes out for schooling bluefish and spanish mackerel. You may also get the

chance to tangle with a king mackerel or a shark while you are out in the blue water.

As a final word, fall is a great time to be in NC fishing for your favorites. But PLEASE REMEMBER TO BE COURTEOUS WHEN YOU ARE ON THE WATER!! Don't run your boat at full motor when you are going down a narrow creek and you can see other anglers working the water. That disturbance will ruin the fishing for those already in the area, AND it will ruin it for you as well. If you are ready to leave an area that has other anglers in it, please idle out quietly for a safe distance before you accelerate out to your next spot. No one owns the water, and if someone is in "your spot" quietly move on to "your next spot" because no amount of yelling, "close casting", or other such tactics will move another boat off of an area that is holding fish. If you see someone working an area of the bank, please don't motor just ahead of them and cut them off just because you want to fish that area as well. By the same token, if you are near a boat that is on fish, don't squeeze in tight to that boat to try and work the same group of fish. Be respectful of each other out there, we are all trying to do the same thing: have a great day catching fish.

## **Cooler Weather Paddling**



Many paddlers think that cooler weather means you hang up your paddle till Spring. With a little careful preparation you can paddle year round.

Dressing for the weather is the key to comfortable paddling. The priority is staying dry. To accomplish this, start from the bottom up. It's easy to launch your boat and keep your feet dry but landing may present a different problem of having to put your feet in the water. This is not much of a concern because you can get to your vehicle and dry off your feet and change into dry shoes before loading your boat. I usually wear easy on and off shoes and often wear warm wool socks that I will slip off before climbing out of my boat. I wear my normal paddling shorts with rain or wind pants over them. This keeps my lap dry from any paddle splash and also when I climb out of the boat the rain pants shed the water. You can also use a paddle skirt to keep out the drips. The key to keeping your upper body dry and warm is wear a rain jacket. A hat is always important year round but you may need a heavier one for cooler days. Some paddlers

will wear wet suits or dry suits. These can be expensive and do not breath when you paddle. I always carry a high-energy snack, a lighter and fire starter in a waterproof bag in my pocket. Also I carry a change of clothes

in a dry bag. For cooler weather following all the normal safety rules is even more important. Always wear your life vest (it's an extra layer of insulation) with a whistle attached. Brightly colored clothing and vest are important for visibility. Always paddle with a partner and let people know where you will be paddling and when to expect you back. Carry a cell phone in a waterproof container. Always check the weather conditions especially the wind direction and speed. Many of our creeks in Pamlico County are great for paddling. The narrower creeks are more sheltered from the cool breezes. Beard's Creek and the South Branch of the Bay River/Neal Creek are good cool weather paddles.

In the cooler months you'll see a different environment and different wildlife along the way. It's a great time of year to see our seasonal ducks and geese. Also a good time to keep and eye out for our seasonal White Pelican and Tundra Swans.

See you up the creek - WITH a paddle.
