Graduates honored, awards presented at PCC's 2019 Commencement

Dozens of newly minted graduates crossed the stage at Pamlico Community College's Delamar Center Friday night to receive the associate's degrees, diplomas, certificates and other credentials they had earned this academic year.

The college also presented its most prestigious annual awards during the joyous and uplifting Commencement ceremony.

"You're the reason we're here," said Reuben F. Young, a North Carolina Court of Appeals judge who delivered the Commencement address.

PCC President Dr. Jim Ross congratulated the students for overcoming life's challenges, including the chaos unleashed by Hurricane Florence, to graduate at a rate 50 percent higher than the national average for community college students.

"Community colleges are the higher education success story in America," the president said.

More than 70 men and women qualified to graduate with associate's degrees, diplomas and certificates from PCC over the last year, including those who completed their coursework in the Spring 2019 semester, the Fall 2018 semester and the Summer 2018 session.

In addition, nearly 40 men and women earned Continuing Education credentials or high school equivalency diplomas this year.

The ceremony's first honoree was Tyeshia Bryant, who received the 2019 Academic Excellence Award and also was named the college's Student of the Year. Bryant, who graduated at the event with her Associate in Applied Science degree in Medical Office Administration, was selected from among three nominees.

During the ceremony, Vice President of Student Services Jamie Gibbs presented her with a plaque and a medallion. He noted that Bryant had maintained a perfect 4.0 grade point average, even though Hurricane Florence displaced her and her family in September 2018.

As the recipient of the Academic Excellence Award, Bryant becomes Pamlico's 2019 honoree in the N.C. Community College System's "Great within the 58" list of high-achieving students.

Mathematics Instructor Cameron Kishel received the college's Instructor of the Year Award. The award, which recognizes outstanding teaching, is voted on annually by students.

Kishel has been on a winning streak: Last December, Ross presented him with the President's Award, which recognizes a college employee who exhibits outstanding professionalism, productivity and a positive attitude.

Vice President of Instructional Services Michelle Willis presented the Instructor of the Year Award to Kishel.

Maintenance Director George Willey accepted the Staff Member of the Year Award, which is voted on by college employees. Willey was recognized for his stellar work to keep the college's buildings and grounds in great shape and for his efforts to keep the college's storm shelter operating smoothly in the aftermath of Hurricane Florence.

Chief Financial Officer Sherry Raby presented Willey with the award.

The college's Alumnus of the Year Award went to Pamlico County Commissioner Candy Bohmert. She graduated with an Associate's Degree in Environmental Science Technology and went on to a career with Pamlico County Soil and Water Conservation.

A reception with refreshments took place in the Johnson Building following the ceremony. While there, graduates and their families had an opportunity to have a free family portrait taken. Each complimentary portrait was placed in a special frame and was available to take home that night.

Ann Windley Age 95 Aurora, NC



Last week I had the opportunity to interview Mrs. Ann Windley of Aurora. She is 95 and served as a nurse during World War II. Her story is written below. I thought it would be a good story for military service month. She is a most delightful lady, independent and interesting. I could easily have spent several hours just visiting with her. Hope you enjoy the story as much as I did talking with her.

"I went to the University of Georgia Junior College in Atlanta. The reason I went there is because I was planning on going into nursing school; but at that point, Emery required chemistry. I had not had chemistry in high school. So, I went to junior college to take it. That was back then. Anyway, they called us into the auditorium and they had the radios turned up. Roosevelt was speaking and telling us what happened, the "Day of Infamy." We didn't know exactly what it meant. We had heard of Pearl Harbor. Of course we knew there was a war going on in Europe. We hadn't thought too much about the Japanese. So, it was like everyone else, pretty much a surprise. Anyway, that was the beginning of the war for me. I had had several friends who had graduated. Some of the boys had their numbers and went ahead and joined knowing they would get called up anyway. So they chose their field. I think some had already been sent to Europe. Maybe just for training. When war was declared, they needed nurses, so they lowered the requirements of chemistry. We had chemistry as one of our courses. But it wasn't totally as hard as when I took it in college. They taught it as it applied to what we needed it in nursing. So I went to nursing school at Emery University. I don't remember how many of us were in that first class after the war was declared, but something like thirty or forty and the dean of nurses told us that probably no more than eighteen of us would graduate. I think twelve of us did. It wasn't easy. But we did it. I did it. So when the last six months, I think, of the developing Nurse Corps sort of evolved and Cadet Nurse Corp, which was really nothing military, we had uniforms. I think they expected everybody in the Cadet Nurse Corp to go into the military but a lot of them did not. Some of them may have gone into it later, but not right out of school like a few of us did. I went into the navy. Some went into the army.





An organization that provides free, on-campus mental health counseling and a state senator who works tirelessly as an advocate for Pamlico Community College were recognized as recipients of 2019 President's Extraordinary Partnership Awards at last Friday's Commencement ceremony.

Both Promise Place, represented by therapist Gayle Westberg, and Sen. Norman Sanderson, were present at the event to receive the awards from PCC President Dr. Jim Ross.

"For anything great to happen, you've got to have great partnerships," Ross said, noting that the college has achieved tremendous success in recent years, and needs extraordinary partners to keep the momentum going.

"We want to keep moving forward, and the only way we can do it is through extraordinary partnerships," he said.

This is the second year Ross and PCC have presented Extraordinary Partnership Awards. Both of this year's recipients played critical roles in the college's ongoing efforts to recover and move forward after Hurricane Florence last September.

Promise Place was honored for its work to bring free, high quality mental health services to the PCC campus. Ross said all colleges are trying to find ways to help students and employees deal with mental health issues, and Promise Place enables PCC to effectively do so.

A Promise Place representative is on campus one day per week to meet with students and employees who need help. Ross said it was critical to address mental health needs in the same way that physical needs were handled.

"It is extremely important that we look at mental illness as we do physical illness," he said. "When you break your leg, see a professional. When your spirit is broken, see a professional."

In her remarks, Westberg outlined some of Promise Place's

services and invited the audience members to contact the organization if they need help. She also congratulated the graduates and thanked the college for the recognition.

"This is such an honor for us," Westberg said.

Sanderson received an Extraordinary Partnership Award for the second year in a row. Last year, he was honored for his work to secure funding for PCC's innovative associate's degree program at Pamlico Correctional Institution, a program that has since exceeded all goals in preparing offenders to succeed in life as productive citizens and reduce recidivism.

This year, the senator was honored for his strong support of legislation to help Pamlico and other affected community colleges recover from Hurricane Florence. Key components of the legislation included funds for building repairs, direct help to affected students and money to offset the colleges' enrollment losses for students who had to leave school or reduce their course loads.

"I've never met a public official who cares more about human beings and making lives better," Ross said, adding that Sanderson was a great supporter of PCC and its students.

In his remarks, Sanderson noted that he'd been associated with the college for 47 years, saying he had received training and instruction at PCC that helped him throughout his career.

He praised the college's family atmosphere and commitment to students' success.

Sanderson also noted the college's positive effects on Pamlico County and said it was an easy choice to be an advocate for PCC.

"It touches more citizens of Pamlico County than any other institution that I know," he said. "It's not hard to advocate for this community college because it's the right thing to do."

Teacher Appreciation Week

Last week was teacher appreciation week. Teachers are among some of the hardest working, underappreciated, and underpaid workers there are. We (and I was a teacher for nearly 40 years) like to consider ourselves professionals, but it is hard to be a professional when we are paid minimum wages. North Carolina teachers rank 29th in the nation based on teacher pay and 39th in the nation based on per pupil expenditure. During the week, the PTA/PTO usually provides lunch for the teachers or some type of sweets in the lounge. The principals usually provide some sort of special goodie, and usually the School Board provides something as well, all to recognize the importance of the classroom teacher. These things are all well and good, and deeply appreciated by the teachers, but how about a nice raise in teacher supplements as well? How about a nice teacher raise to bring the teacher pay up to standard with the rest of the nation? How about putting more money into the public schools to reduce teacher-student ratios? How about adding more teacher assistants to help out with instruction? Don't just tell me you love me, show me!

Teaching is one of the powerful professions there is. A teacher has the power to create a Winston Churchill or a Bobby Kennedy out of an immature and shy child. At the same time, they have the power to create an Adolph Hitler as well. In all reality, a teacher holds the future of that child in the grasp of his hand while he has that child in his care and can make or break that child, help that child become a success or a failure. I have seen teachers boost the self-esteem of their students in and out of their classrooms, while I have seen other teachers crush the spirit of their students.

Growing up I had one teacher for four years who would yell at and fuss at certain students calling them dumb and saying they would never amount to anything. Well, guess how they turned out? At the same time, I saw another teacher who laughed with his students, praised them for their work, and interacted with them in a positive way. Guess how his students turned out? That still goes on today. I mentioned Robert Kennedy earlier. Robert Kennedy failed 2nd grade. That could have been a defining

moment in Kennedy's life, and indeed it was. BUT it could have created a man where he was used to failure and thus became a failure throughout life because of his second grade experience. But the next year, his teacher worked with him closely and he was able to succeed and become successful, catch up and continue to be successful in school and out of school. This second grade teacher gave him self-confidence, self-esteem, and success. These are attributes which carried on with him through the rest of his life.

I also mentioned Winston Churchill. Churchill was born of a wealthy family, socialites if you will. But before long, they were divorced and Churchill was living in a split family, a divided home. As a result his parents indulged him and gave him everything but the love and affection he so desperately needed and cried for. So, he was somewhat spoiled. His first grade teacher wrote on his transcript that year that Churchill was spoiled, lazy, and would never amount to much in life. The next year, his second grade teacher, seeing what his first grade teacher had written, agreed with her and followed suit by repeating the diagnosis of his school year. The third year was different. There the teacher did not read the previous notes and took time to get to know the students prior to reading all the notes the previous teachers had written. She took Winston Churchill and found him to be very brilliant, witty, charming, and hard working. She pushed him and encouraged him that year and his grades were top notch. He had a most successful third grade year, all because the teacher saw potential in him and nurtured that. One teacher turned two bad years into one good one and turned Churchill around. That is the power a teacher has over his/her students.

What about Adolph Hitler? We don't have that type of material on Hitler's early teachers, but we do know that at about age 16 or so, he applied to art school. There he submitted some of his art for review and was turned down for admission. He was told that his art did not measure up, that it was not good enough. This was a crushing blow to Hitler and he became very upset and angry as a result. Suppose he received a letter suggesting that he try some tutoring for a year and then reapply to school? Or suppose they had suggested that he apply to a private artist to work as an understudy for a year and then reapply? But no, they said

his work was no good. This was a major blow to his ego. And yes, for fun, what would have happened if he had been accepted to art school and had become a successful artist of the 20th century? (Not going to happen, his art really wasn't that good.) But just suppose. History would have turned out quite differently.

For me I languished through elementary schools being an average student not really caring about school or doing my best or enjoying school at all. Not until eighth grade! Along came Andrew J. Hill. He taught us science and PE. (Neither of which were my favorite subjects.) But he took a special interest in me and as a result he turned my year around. He gave me confidence in what I was doing. He helped me see things I had never realize before. He opened my eyes to a whole new world in school and helped me by encouraging me in school and outside of school. He taught me science, health and PE but more importantly, he taught ME.

All over North Carolina and I have seen it a lot in Pamlico County, there are teachers who love what they are doing and are teaching kids every day. Yes, they are teaching English, math, science, social studies, history, and more; but most importantly of all, they are teaching KIDS. They are here because they love the children and they interact with them daily. Yes, at times they have to fuss at them to get their attention or to correct inappropriate behavior, but for the most part you will find them laughing with and playing with and dancing with and singing with and enjoying your children from Kindergarten through Twelfth Grade. If you haven't thanked your teacher for teaching your child, for loving your child, and giving your child the many daily gifts he or she gives, stop what you are doing and write that teacher a note and tell him/her how much you really do appreciate them. Next time you are at the Golden Corral eating, why not pick up a gift card for your child's teacher and say thank you. It doesn't have to be Teacher Appreciation Week, any day will do in any week. I promise they will light up and smile a bit and make that day a most special day for that teacher. And yes, your child will receive a little bit of a reward that day too.

Carrot Cake Made Easy

Filling:
2 packages (3-oz. each) cream cheese, softened
3 tablespoons sugar
1 egg

Cake:
1 egg
1 cup milk
1/2 cup butter, melted
2 packages (8.1-oz. each) Martha White Carrot Cake Muffin Mix

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 8 or 9 inch square pan. In a small bowl, combine all topping ingredients; beat until smooth. Set aside. Beat 1 egg in medium bowl. Add all remaining cake ingredients; stir until well blended. Pour into greased pan. Drop spoonfuls of filling over the batter. With knife, swirl filling into batter, turning some of batter over top of filling. Bake in 350 degree oven for 35 to 45 minutes or until topping is set. Cool in pan on wire rack for 30 minutes or until completely cooled. Cut into squares. Store in refrigerator. Serves 9.

Saturday Night Casserole

1/2 of an 8-ounce package of noodles
1 can (10-1/2-oz.) cream of mushroom soup
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon instant minced onions
2 teaspoons prepared mustard
1 cup sour cream
2 cups leftover cooked ham, cut into 1-inch cubes
1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
Parmesan cheese, grated (to sprinkle over the top)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Generously butter a 1-1/2 quart casserole - set aside. Cook noodles according to directions on package and drain well - set aside. In a small saucepan, combine the soup and milk and stir until smooth, add the onions, mustard and sour cream and blend well. In the prepared dish, layer half the cooked noodles, and half the ham and half the sauce. Repeat. Melt the butter or margarine and toss in the bread crumbs and blend well to coat. Sprinkle buttered crumbs over the casserole and top with generous amount of grated Parmesan cheese. Bake-uncovered-in 350 degree oven for about 30 minutes or until top is golden brown. Serves 6.



Easy Oven Browned Potatoes

4 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into small chunks
Salt and pepper
6 to 8 tablespoons butter, melted (or olive oil)
Salt and pepper, to taste

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Line a baking pan with aluminum foil ñ set aside.

Toss the potato chunks with the melted butter or olive oil until well coated. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place potatoes in prepared pan in single layer. Bake for about 45 minutes, turning one time, or until tender and nicely browned. Serves 4.

Southwestern Pasta

3 large sweet onions (about 2-1/4 lbs. total)
1/4 cup olive oil
1-1/2 teaspoons ground cumin
1-1/2 teaspoons chili powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
Dash of cayenne pepper
1 can (14.5 oz.) diced tomatoes, drained
3/4 cup frozen corn kernels
1 can (14.5 oz.) chicken broth
12 ounces fettuccine, cooked according to directions on package
1 cup grated Monterey Jack cheese
2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro, if desired

Peel the sweet onions and cut into 1/4-inch thick rings. In a large and deep skillet, heat the olive oil over medium-low heat. Add the onions, cumin, chili powder, salt and cayenne pepper and cook-covered-for 10 minutes. Uncover and continue cooking-stirring frequently-until onions are soft and golden - about 15 or 20 minutes. Stir in the tomatoes and corn, cook 2 minutes longer. Pour in the chicken stock and increase heat to high. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the sauce thickens slightly - about 10 minutes. Add the cooked pasta to the sauce and cook one minute longer, stirring to coat the pasta with the sauce. Stir in the cheese. Serve immediately and garnish with cilantro, if desired. Serves 6.

Grands Tuna Melts

2 cans (6-oz. each) water packed tuna, well drained
1/3 cup chopped onions
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/8 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 can (16.3 oz.) Pillsbury Grands Refrigerated Original or Buttermilk Flaky Layers Biscuits
1 cup grated Cheddar cheese
Sour cream, if desired
Chopped tomatoes, if desired
Shredded lettuce, if desired

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease baking sheet. In a medium bowl, combine the tuna, onions, mayonnaise, salt and pepper and blend well. Separate dough into 8 biscuits. Place 4 biscuits on greased baking sheet; press or roll each to form 5-inch rounds. Spoon tuna mixture in center of biscuits.

2 cups chopped pimiento
1/4 to 1/2 cup tomato juice

In a skillet, combine the Worcestershire sauce, onion flakes and pimiento and cook until onions absorb liquid. Add the tuna and tomato juice and cook until dry or until the consistency of barbecue.

WesternGeco proposes conducting a Marine Geophysical Survey via 2D seismic testing off the North Carolina coast to gather geological and geophysical data that could provide information about the feasibility of future development of offshore oil and gas resources. The survey would involve a vessel towing seismic airgun arrays. Documents pertaining to the proposed project are available on online at <https://deq.nc.gov/about/divisions/coastal-management/coastal-management-permits/federal-consistency/national-oil-and-seismic-surveys>.

The survey would take place entirely in federal waters, adjacent to North Carolina's coastal zone. State law does not require coastal development permits for projects outside of the state waters, but the federal Coastal Zone Management Act requires federal applicants to coordinate with the state for any proposed activity that affects land use, water use or any natural resource within the coastal zone.

Naval Hospital my entire time. I thoroughly enjoyed it. Being in it, it was no hard duties, no more than what we were used to. But by the time the boys got there, most of them came there from the Pacific Theater. We had a few from the European Theater, but most were from the Pacific Theater because the European War was over rather shortly in April. These boys had already been to a hospital in Hawaii and then California. By the time we got them, most of them were recuperating. Of course, they still had some broken bones, some had diseases, and we still had some that had, I remember one guy, that was critically wounded, not a well boy at all. But they were all, I don't remember but just a few, and I try to forget those, were just good guys and fun and appreciated us being there. They were just waiting to get out and go home. So they were pretty happy when they did. But we had very few really hard cases. It was fun because the guys were most of them were all just pleasant

"That was just my choice. I was in the Kennedy Army Hospital when I was in the Cadet Corps, so they really thought I was going into the army. But I didn't. When I graduated from Emory, after I came back from Kennedy, actually I was not 21, I could not pass my Georgia State Boards. I had already taken my State Boards, but I could not be an RN until I was 21. I could not go in the Navy. Although I had already applied, I could not go into that, until I was 21. So I went home until I was 21. Then I went in immediately, I think.

to be around and fun. They either treated you like your girlfriend or sister. As I said, to me it was a good experience. I had no bad experiences.

"That was a very large hospital. A medical surgical center. We did have German POWs. They had one ward for that, pretty heavily guarded. I worked on that ward. It was a little bit intimidating. Nothing but perfect behavior. But of course those guys standing in the halls with guns kind of make you behave. It would change your mind anyway. They didn't speak English and we didn't speak German. You just did what was necessary. Portsmouth was a very large hospital. I don't even know how many wards because I didn't get to go in all of them. I had certain areas I worked in. We rotated. After three months, we would change to another ward, whether it be medical or surgical.

"That's where I met my husband, so I got something out of it. Here in Aurora. He got out, in those days, married nurses could not stay in. We had to get out. So when I turned my marriage papers in, when they started processing them they started processing my separation. But Dan got out very shortly after I did. He had enough points for him to get out pretty quickly. So, then we came on to Aurora. And I've been here ever since. He had been wounded and he was recuperating. He was well enough to be put on limited duty. And so they took the marines and put them on for guard duty for the naval base. He was on the gate one night. I was supposed to have had a date and was stood up. He felt sorry for me and walked me home. His story is that he told me that my stocking seams were crooked and thus I was out of uniform. That's his story. I don't remember that happening. Anyway, he was enlisted and I was an officer, and that didn't go over too well. My commanding officer when I turned my papers in said, "This is how well you follow rules and regulations of the navy." I said, "Yes, Mamm." "It's too late now!" So we lived in Portsmouth just off base until he got discharged. They said it wouldn't last. The kids had a celebration for us. Our Sixtieth. He was sick and really didn't want to go but with much persuasion he went and then he died in September. That was in March. But it was all good."

Why Should Recent Graduates Care About Retirement Planning?

If you've graduated from college in the past year or so and started your first job, you're no doubt learning a lot about establishing yourself as an adult and being responsible for your own finances. So thoughts of your retirement are probably far away. And yet you have several good reasons to invest in your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan.

First of all, by contributing to your 401(k), you can get into the habit of regular investing. And since you invest in your 401(k) through regular payroll deductions, it's an easy way to invest.

Furthermore, your 401(k) or similar plan is an excellent retirement-savings vehicle. You generally contribute pre-tax dollars to your 401(k), so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. Plus, your earnings can grow on a tax-deferred basis. Your employer might also offer a Roth 401(k), which is funded with after-tax dollars; although you can't deduct your contributions, your earnings can grow tax-free, provided you meet certain conditions.

And with either a traditional or Roth 401(k), you generally have a wide array of investment options.

But perhaps the main reason to start investing right away in your 401(k) is that, at this point of your life, you have access to the greatest and most irreplaceable asset of all – time. The more time you have on your side, the greater the growth potential for your investments. And by starting to invest early in your plan, you can put in smaller amounts without having to play catch-up later.

Suppose, for example, you begin investing in your 401(k) or similar plan when you're 25. For the sake of simplicity, let's say you put in \$100 a month, and you keep investing that same amount for 40 years, earning a hypothetical 7 percent rate of return. When you reach 65, you will have accumulated about \$256,000. (Your withdrawals will then be taxable, unless you chose the Roth 401(k) option.) But if you waited until you were 45 before you started investing in your 401(k), again earning that hypothetical 7 percent, you'd have to put in almost \$500 per month – about five times the monthly amount you could

have invested when you were 25 – to arrive at the same \$256,000 when you turn 65.

Clearly, the expression "time is money" applies when it comes to funding your 401(k) – there's just no benefit in waiting to contribute to your retirement plan. This isn't to say that you have a lot of disposable income, especially as you may be paying off thousands of dollars in student loans. But, as mentioned above, the money for your 401(k) is taken before you even see it, so, in a sense, you won't miss it. And you can certainly start out with small amounts, though you'll at least want to put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered. As your career progresses and your salary goes up, you can steadily increase the amount you put into your 401(k) or other retirement plan.

When retirement is decades away, it can seem like more of an abstract concept than something that will one day define your reality. But, as we've seen, you have plenty of incentives to contribute to your 401(k) or similar plan – so, if you haven't already done so, get started soon.

Trade shows, expos, and networking events can be excellent ways to attract business...if you understand that they are netWORKing events. They are not net-eating, net-visiting, net-standing-around-waiting-for-someone-to-talk-to-you events. The term, "networking" means "the action or process of interacting with others to exchange information and develop professional or social contacts".

These events can establish your credibility, help you meet new prospects, network with current customers and allies, and even practice new sales techniques. Event visitors come specifically because of their connection to your market so you are meeting fewer suspects and more prospects.

The first item on your plan for the Expo is to prepare. If you think about it, the more you prep for a big day or a big presentation the better it will turn out. You don't need to spend months prepping what you are going to wear the day of the event or what you are going to do when you come up to people. You should prepare and strategize before going to the event at least a week in advance.

The next item on your list is to ensure your booth will attract the right kind of customers. Exhibits often include activities that can allow the attendees to experience your product. For example, you could use social media to attract attendees to create an Instagrammable event so they can share your brand with their peers. The activities at your booth could educate buyers about your products or services. If your business has a Facebook page, consider doing a Facebook Live Event. You could go really high tech by adding virtual reality about your product.

Also, Business Expos can help you reach three major marketing goals: building brand awareness, generating sales leads, and strengthening key relationships. Exhibitors will often launch new products, especially since an attendee's goal is to see what's new.

And the last item to remember, communication with the attendees is a must. Talk with the attendees to find out what their needs are, remember they are the customer and they may have an opinion. Listen closely and keep an open mind. Let them speak; try not to interrupt.

If you are attending a business expo, try not to head for the food table; and don't just stop and grab the exhibitors' candy! Even if you are not interested in their product or service, they have worked hard to be where they are today. Small businesses are the backbone of Pamlico County. Let's show them our support and respect!




Confederate Memorial Day Cedar Grove Cemetery, New Bern

On May 11, 2019, the Rains Brothers Camp of the Sons of Confederate Veterans along with the 5th North Carolina Troops, Company D, held memorial services in Cedar Grove Cemetery in New Bern in honor of Confederate Memorial Day. Confederate Memorial Day is a holiday observed in Southern states on various dates since the Civil War to remember the 258,000 Confederate soldiers and sailors who died fighting against the Union. In the spring of April, 1866, the Ladies Memorial Association of Columbus, Georgia, passed a resolution to set aside one day annually to memorialize the Confederate war dead. Mary Ann Williams, the association secretary, was directed to pen a letter inviting ladies' associations in every former Confederate state to join them in the observance. In North Carolina, we celebrate Confederate Memorial Day on May 10th to commemorate the death of Stonewall Jackson who died on that day in 1863.

Following the Memorial Service in Cedar Grove Cemetery, the Rains Brothers Camp of the Sons of Confederate Veterans hosted a hot dog cook out at Union Point, providing free hot dogs, drinks, and chips for those who were in the park as a public service and camp promotional. The Rains Brothers Camp SCV meets on the Second Thursday night at 7 pm, with supper at 6 pm, at Moores Old Time Barbeque each month. more magical for kids with weeks of freedom from long days inside, end of term exams, and harsh fluorescent lights. Summer is a time for exploration and curiosity, a time that seems imbued, to the millisecond, with possibility. Anything can be discovered. Anything can be learned. It is a time, however, when great loss can occur.

Every summer, the months off from school cost our kids, on average, a month of school year learning. These months of vacation, can result in children returning to school a month behind the benchmarks they're expected to meet. Beginning the school year following a summer without intellectual challenges can make it difficult for some children to meet this year's objectives, as well as, prepare for the following year. While it is possible to recover this summer loss, it is also possible that the loss is compounded every year, increasing more dramatically as children reach higher and higher levels of education. The most significant decline is found in math, one of the key hard skills needed for employment as our industries grow more and more dependent on individuals skilled in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math).

On top of this summer learning loss, in the last twenty years the time kids spend outside has decreased by fifty percent. Time outside hiking, gardening, playing sports, engaging in activities surrounded by green space has a great impact on children from reducing levels of obesity to decreasing high levels of stress.

If children aren't spending summers outside adventuring, where is the magic coming from? Can the magic of summer also put a stopper on that learning loss? There are many fun things to do in the summer; enjoy one of Pamlico County's parks, join a summer sports league, or join us for one of our 4-H Summer Fun camps. 4-H Summer Fun not only keeps kids engaged, curious, and learning, but it also connects kids to peers with similar interests. Last year we had great fun engineering towers that could withstand an earthquake, sewing our own bags, and learning about nutrition.


