Day Trippin' Cape Lookout National Seashore

Summer is here and COVID is over. Well, maybe over, or at least in decline with a lot of restrictions being lifted. People are ready to go somewhere, anywhere, as long as it's out of their house and neighborhood. The staff at The Pamlico News seemed to like the idea of reporting on places to travel to, but my suggestion of The Bahamas or Cancun just didn't seem to fit the budget, so writing a series on day trips within reach of Pamlico County seemed to fit the bill. Since it is summer and I have beaches and bikinis on my mind, somewhere with sand and surf seemed a good place to start.



The Cape Lookout National Seashore is a ribbon of undeveloped beach that begins at Ocracoke Inlet in the north and runs south along Core Banks to Cape Point and then westerly along Shackleford Banks to Beaufort Inlet, fifty-six miles of mostly unspoiled beaches. There is lots to do at the Seashore from touring the historic village of Portsmouth on the north end to watching the Shackleford Island ponies on the southern

end. In between, there is fishing, surfing, shelling, birding, swimming, and sunbathing. Since I like sitting on the beach doing nothing, my wife likes shelling, and we both like lighthouses, we concentrated our day trip on the central location of the lighthouse itself. They say half the fun is getting there, and if you want to get over there, you will have to take a boat. No problem, as long as you have \$18 (\$11 for ages 3-11) for the round trip ferry ride that departs every half hour from the National Park Service

Visitor Center on Harker's Island. Reservations are recommended, particularly during the summer. The Visitor Center is located at 1800 Island Road in Harker's Island. Once you get to Harker's Island, follow the main road until it ends at the eastern tip of the island. When you can't go any further, you are there. The Visitor Center itself has some nice exhibits about the park as well as plenty of information from their friendly staff.

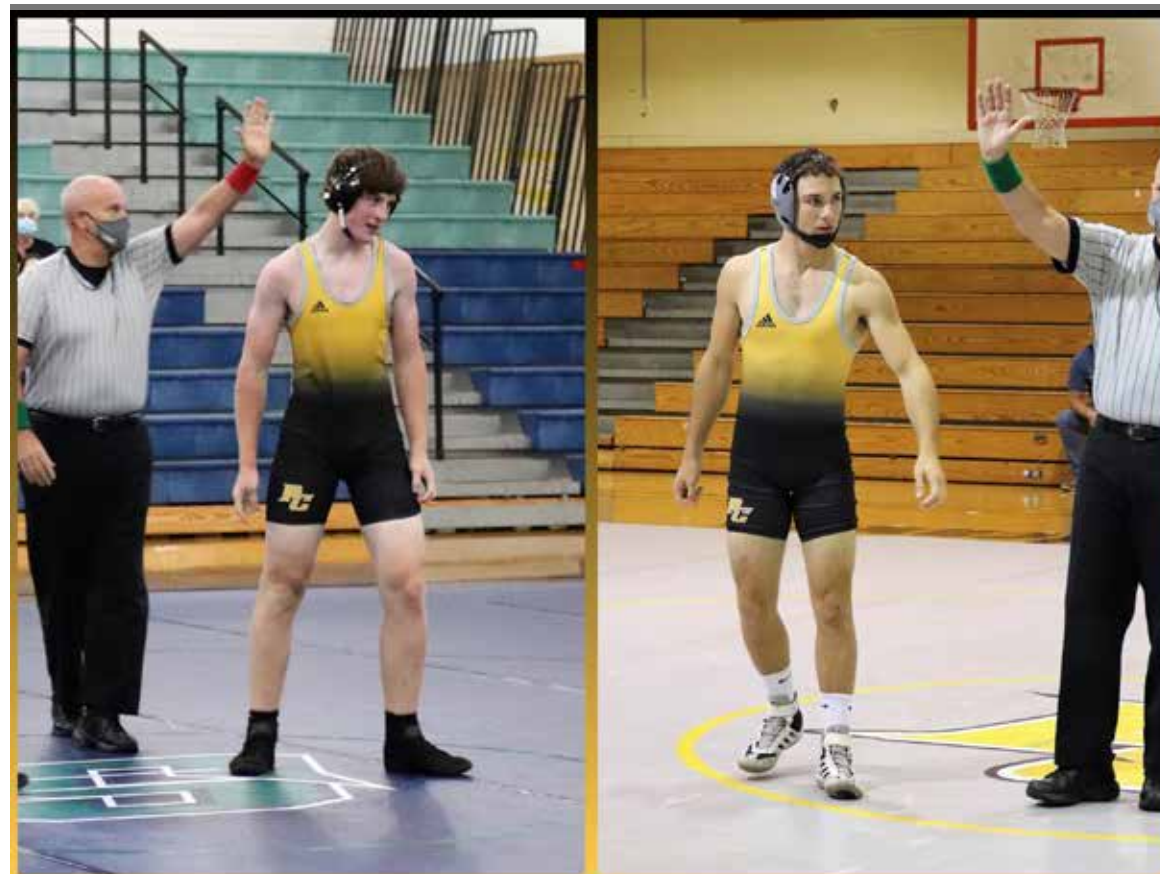

All the honorees have passed on, but family members were present to represent these members of the greatest generation. In addition to these 5, Dr. Jim Ross, President of Pamlico Community College shared memories of his father who participated in the D-Day invasion. His brother Robert, sister-in-law, Laura, and nephews, Brian and Daniel were also nearby. Dick also has three grandchildren who love him very much: Michael (deceased), Casimir, and Ondine.

Dick was born in Ohio in 1941 and grew up in Chicago. He was a decorated boy scout and good son to his mother Catherine and father, Richard Sr. He graduated with a Bachelor’s in electrical engineering from the University of Illinois and then joined the Air Force where he earned his Captain’s rank and Master degrees in both Electrical Engineering and Business. In Albuquerque, his first wife Judy (deceased) had their first two daughters Lisa and Kathy. After the Air Force, he got a job with IBM as an engineer and then as an Executive. Dick married Penny Brose in 1985. In 1995, he retired and moved to St Petersburg, FL and became a Captain once again, this time in the nautical sense. He and his first mate, Penny, sailed throughout the Caribbean on their catamaran, Penelope. After their Caribbean adventures, small town Oriental, NC became home, and he

lived his last years in the loving company of his wonderful friends and neighbors there.

Dick loved the outdoors, traveling and fixing things. He was an athlete in non-competitive outdoor sports: hiker, skier, diver, bicyclist and sailor (he saved his competitive talents for cards and other games with his family and was famous for almost always winning). Dick’s Scouting career, Air Force career, corporate career, and post-retirement sailing career offered great opportunities to travel and he saw much of the world, visiting every continent except Antarctica. A real Mr. Fixit, Dick loved gadgets and puzzles that would have daunted others. His family always knew “Dad’ll fix it” and will miss his genius with electronics, carpentry, bread making, basket weaving and more. With a full, eventful life came lots and lots of stories. Anyone who met Dick heard at least a few and he enjoyed exchanging tales with old and new friends. Dick will be remembered for being kind, patient, gentlemanly, funny, athletic, strong, and super smart. He will be missed every day, and while his family will now have to figure out how to fix things themselves; they will have a better chance at winning a card game.

A celebration of his life will take place on Thursday, June 17th at 3:00 pm at Lou Mac Park in Oriental. In the event of rain, the service will take place at the United Methodist Church.

Pamlico Community College's Continuing Education division is launching four short-term health care courses this month to help men and women explore new career options and sharpen their skills for the workplace.

Beginning later this month, the college will offer its popular Nurse Aide I and II courses, as well as courses in Cardiac Monitor Technician and Phlebotomy.

Students who successfully complete one of these courses will be qualified to apply for jobs in the fast-growing health care sector. Others will become more valuable at their current jobs.

"The college's short-term health care courses are ideal for men and women who want to explore careers in the medical field or who want to enhance their skills for the health care workplace," said PCC President Dr. Jim Ross. "These courses include face-to-face instruction on campus as well as clinical work in health care settings around the area. Our instructors are highly qualified professionals, and the college's staff is available to help students get started."

Scholarships also are available for students who qualify, said PCC Chair of Continuing Education and Technical Programs Lori Giles.

- Nurse Aide I, which will begin Tuesday, June 15. It will meet Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Nurse Aide II, which will start Monday, June 14. The course will meet Mondays and Wednesdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

'Among Us'-shaped McNugget sells for nearly \$100,000

June 4 (UPI) -- A McDonald's Chicken McNugget that bears a resemblance to the player characters in popular video game Among Us sold on eBay for just short of \$100,000.

The McNugget, listed by eBay user polizna, started at only 99 cents, but after 184 bids the item sold for \$99,997.

The listing said the "Among Us shaped nugget" came from a McDonald's BTS meal, a combo meal inspired by K-pop band BTS. The seller promised the nugget would be delivered in edible condition.

"This food product has an average expiration of about 14 days and will be delivered prior to expiration," the listing states.

The eBay post caught the attention of the official Among Us account on Twitter, which shared a link to the auction. The post received a reply from the official Xbox account, which suggested the nugget should come with a packet of McDonald's Szechuan sauce.

"I have Szechuan and at buyers request will ship some with the nugget," polizna wrote in response to the suggestion.

It was unclear whether the buyer requested the sauce.

Discuss financial goals with your family

June is Effective Communications Month. And it's a good idea to recognize the importance of good communications, because it plays a role in almost every aspect of living – including your finances. Managing Scale Insects

The most common insect pests in Pamlico County are scale insects. These insects often go unnoticed due to their small size and flat shape. When they are noticed, they are easily confused for diseases because of their color and their inability to move when mature.

Scale insects are a diverse group of pests that live on a wide range of plants, especially woody ornamentals. Camellias, hollies, maples, and euonymus are among the plants often troubled by this pest. Scales are divided into two groups, armored scale and soft scale, with many species in each group. Armored scale insects are quite small, usually less than 1/8" in size depending on the species. They are called "armored" because the female is covered with a hard covering created by waxy secretions. This shell protects the soft-bodied insect underneath, as well as the eggs laid by the female. Once the eggs hatch, nymphs move out from under the protective cover of the mother. It is these new nymphs called crawlers, that are most vulnerable to pesticides. Once crawlers become adults, they produce the waxy secretion that protects them and attach themselves to plants, becoming immobile and feeding on plant juices. Armored scale vary in shape from circular to elongated, sometimes resembling an oyster shell. Males and females may look quite different in size and shape for the same species, with the female usually larger.

Compared to armored scale, soft scale are relatively large and may look fluffy or like a ball of white wax, so in the adult form they are readily visible. Soft scale do not have a removable shell covering like the armored scale. In addition to feeding on plant juices, soft scale impact plant health by secreting honeydew, which is high in sugars. Honeydew causes a secondary problem, a fungal disease called sooty mold, which covers the bark and leaves with a black substance resembling soot. Sooty mold impacts plant health by blocking light from reaching the leaves, thereby decreasing photosynthesis. Tremendous populations can develop during a single growing season. Some of the more common species include Indian wax scale, oak lecanium scale and cottony maple leaf scale.

Control of all scale species is challenging because of the protection from pesticides provided by the wax and armored covering. Dormant/horticultural oils and insecticidal soap are the least toxic options for control. Oils are most successful during winter when heavy rates can be used to kill insects. Complete coverage is essential for optimal control. Other common insecticides are labeled for scale insect control including systemic insecticides; however, ensure that you have identified the scale insect and whether it is an armored scale or soft scale. Armored scale will not be killed by systemic insecticides containing the active ingredient imidacloprid.



Because armored scale are small and inconspicuous, populations may build up unnoticed and cause serious damage to plants. Signs of armored scale infestation include leaf drop, yellowing leaves, and branch dieback. Drought and other stresses can make plants more vulnerable to scale. Common armored scale pests are Euonymus scale which, as the name suggests, is common on many species of Euonymus, and tea scale, often a pest on camellia. Gloomy scale is common on maple trees, where it is hard to see because it blends in with the grey bark.

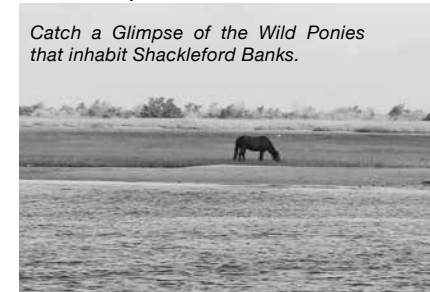

Day Trippin'

There is also a short nature trail to hike and educational programs if you are so inclined. The ferry ride itself takes about 15 minutes and you can be dropped off at either the east end of Shackelford Banks, or at the ferry dock near the lighthouse. You are allowed two carry-on items and as I am all about snacks, I took a small cooler with drinks and food, as well as a beach chair. Although there is a small visitor's center on the island, it's best to bring what you need for the day. You can also rent side-by-side vehicles for expanding your tour of the island. We walked the boardwalk over to the ocean side and picked our spot. If a packed beach full of sunbathers is your thing, this isn't your place. If relaxing in the sun on an uncrowded beach, or walking the surf line in search of shells is your thing, you are in the right location. If the surf is rough for swimming, there is calmer beach along the soundside, but on weekends it can be much more crowded with private boats. As with any beach, use sunscreen and be wary of



rip currents. There are no lifeguards on the beach. The lighthouse itself is currently not open for climbing, but the keeper's quarters are open and contain some great exhibits about the history of the lighthouse and Cape Lookout. The lighthouse is scheduled for a major renovation to begin in the fall and winter of this year and when completed, hopefully by 2023, it will be reopened for climbing. When you're ready to return, just catch a ferry back to the mainland. There is much more to do than I have covered here so for more information check out the park website at www.nps.gov/cal/index.htm and also check out www.islandexpressferry-service.com. Get the most current information and plan the trip that suits you the best.

7 surprising health benefits of walking

Individuals looking for a way to incorporate exercise into their lives need look no further than their own feet. Walking offers numerous health benefits to people of all ages, and it's particularly beneficial to fitness novices. Walking can facilitate a transition between inactivity and increased intensity for those who may have been away from exercise for some time.



Association recommends adults get at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity each week. Walking can fit that bill. Walking five days a week can reduce risk for coronary heart disease by roughly 19 percent, according to a report in the European Journal of Epidemiology.

According to Dr. Thomas Frieden, former director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, walking is "the closest thing people have to a wonder drug." Any physical activity is a boon to personal health, and walking provides a host of benefits.

1. Strengthens bones: Walking can slow down the loss of bone mass due to osteoporosis. Arthritis.org notes that a study of postmenopausal women found that 30 minutes of walking each day reduced their risk of hip fractures by 40 percent.
2. Boosts cardio endurance: Regular walks can improve cardiovascular endurance, which can help people progress to more rigorous physical activity.
3. Burns calories: People can walk to burn calories and maintain or lose weight. The number of calories burned will depend on how briskly people walk, the distance they cover, their body weight, and the terrain on which they walk.
4. Improves cardiovascular health: The American Heart

5. Counteracts effects of weight-promoting genes: Researchers at Harvard Medical School looked at 32 obesity-promoting genes in more than 12,000 people who walked briskly for about an hour a day. Walking reduced the effects of weight-promoting genes by 50 percent.

6. Tame cravings: People who have a sweet tooth can take notice that walking may steer people away from overindulgence. A pair of studies from the University of Exeter found a 15-minute walk can curb cravings for chocolate and reduce the chocolate consumed in stressful situations. Walking also helped to reduce cravings for other sugary snacks.

7. Reduces joint pain: Walking improves blood flow and helps protect the joints. This can keep people from developing arthritis and other stiffness.

Walking has many health benefits that can support the entire body.

Did you know?

Hundreds of rivers and tributaries criss-cross North America. Major ones often supply fresh water to local residents and some even serve as important commercial routes. The Brazos, the Colorado, the Columbia, the Hudson, and the Mississippi are major waterways, but smaller rivers are equally important to people and animals. Each June marks National Rivers Month, when people are encouraged to participate in river cleanup events throughout the month and even through the year. Various nonprofit organizations organize river clean-ups that aim to prevent plastic from entering the world's oceans from rivers. Others help collect trash that otherwise would contaminate rivers and prove harmful to wildlife. River trash is more than an eyesore; it can contaminate drinking water and poison marine life.

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Alzheimer's Association in North Carolina Encourages Americans to Make Brain Health a Priority as Part of Their Return to Normal

RALEIGH, N.C. - June 1, 2021 – With COVID-19 vaccines rolling out across the country, many Americans are looking forward to resuming their lives and returning to normal. This June, during Alzheimer's & Brain Awareness Month, the Alzheimer's Association – Eastern North Carolina Chapter is encouraging North Carolina residents to make brain health an important part of their return to normal.

"The past year has been extremely challenging for most Americans," said Lisa Roberts, Executive Director, Alzheimer's Association – Eastern North Carolina Chapter. "Chronic stress, like that experienced during the pandemic, can impact memory, mood and anxiety. As North Carolina residents begin to return to normal, we encourage them to make brain health a priority."

The Alzheimer's Association offers these five suggestions to promote brain health and to help North Carolina residents restore their mental well-being:

Recommit to Brain-Healthy Basics

Evidence suggests that healthy behaviors took a backseat for many Americans during the pandemic. Gym memberships were put on hiatus, social engagement became more challenging and many Americans swapped out healthful eating for their favorite comfort foods, take-out meals and frequent snacking while working remotely. One study published recently found participants gained nearly 1.5 pounds per month over the past year, on average.

The Alzheimer's Association — through its U.S. POINTER Study — is examining the role lifestyle interventions, including diet, may play in protecting cognitive function. Right now, many experts agree that people can improve their brain health and reduce the risk of cognitive decline by adopting healthy lifestyle habits, preferably in combination, including:

- Exercising regularly
- Maintaining a heart-healthy diet
- Getting proper sleep
- Staying socially and mentally active

Return to Normal at Your Own Pace

Many Americans are eager for a return to normal life following the pandemic, but others are anxious. In fact, one recent survey found that nearly half of adults (49%) report feeling uncomfortable about returning to in-person interactions when the pandemic ends. For those feeling anxious, the Alzheimer's Association suggests taking small steps. It may also be important to set boundaries and communicate your preferences to others in your social circles.

Help Others

There is evidence to suggest that helping others during the pandemic may not only make you feel better, but it may be good for you as well. Research shows that helping others in a crisis can be an effective way to alleviate stress and anxiety. One study published during the pandemic found that adults over age 50 who volunteer for about two hours per week have a substantially reduced risk of dying, higher levels of physical activity and an improved sense of well-being. To help others and yourself during June and throughout the year, volunteer in your community, run errands or deliver meals to a home-bound senior or donate to a favorite cause, such as supporting participants in the Alzheimer's Association's The Longest Day event on June 20.

Unplug and Disconnect

Technology has dominated our daily lives during the pandemic like never before. While technology has kept us connected through COVID-19, it has also created fatigue for many Americans. Experts warn that excessive stimulation coming from our phones, computers, social media sources and news reports can add to our already heightened anxiety levels. To avoid technology overload, experts advise setting limits on your screen time, avoid carrying your phone everywhere, and disconnecting from digital devices at bedtime.

Control Your Stress Before it Controls You

In small doses, stress teaches the brain how to respond in healthy ways to the unexpected, inconvenient or unpleasant realities of daily life. Prolonged or repeated stress, however, can wear down and damage the brain, leading to serious health problems including depression, anxiety disorders, memory loss and increased risk for dementia. Reports indicate that Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers are especially vulnerable to physical and emotional stress. The Alzheimer's Association offers tips to help manage caregiver stress. Meditation, exercise, listening to music or returning to a favorite activity you have missed during the pandemic are just some ways to manage stress. Do what works best for you.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has been an overwhelming time for all of us," Roberts said. "It's important for people to know there are steps we can take to lessen the stress and anxiety we might be feeling. It can be easy to take brain health for granted, but now more than ever, it's a good idea to make it a priority."

Currently, the Alzheimer's Association and representatives from more than 40 countries are working together to study the short- and long-term consequences of COVID-19 on the brain and nervous system in people at different ages, and from different genetic backgrounds.

2021 Summer Safety: Steps You Should Take to

Help Stay Out of Harm's Way

Raleigh, NC (May 25, 2021) - Memorial Day is just around the corner, marking the unofficial start of summer and outdoor fun. The American Red Cross wants everyone to have a safe summer and offers tips and resources for the entire family.

WATER SAFETY

Before going in, on or around the water, every family member should become "water smart." This starts with learning to be safe, making good choices, and learning to swim to at least achieve the skills of water competency. Everyone should be able to enter the water, get a breath, stay afloat, change position, swim a distance and then get out of the water safely. A variety of water safety courses and resources are available to help. To help keep your family safe, the Red Cross offers these tips:

Prevent unsupervised access to water. Fence pools and spas with adequate barriers and keep a constant eye for any water dangers such as portable splash pools/slides, buckets and bathtubs.

Adults should actively supervise children and stay within arm's reach of young children and new swimmers. Kids should follow the rules. Designate a "water watcher" to keep a close eye and constant attention on children and weaker swimmers in and around the water until the next water watcher takes over.

Always wear a properly fitted U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket when on a boat and if in a situation beyond someone's skill level.

Swim as a pair near a lifeguard's chair — everyone, including experienced swimmers, should swim with a buddy even in areas supervised by lifeguards. Always maintain constant attention and actively supervise children even when lifeguards are present.

Download the Red Cross Swim app for safety tips, kid-friendly videos and activities, and take the free Water Safety for Parents and Caregivers online course.

GRILLING SAFETY

Grilling food is so popular that more than three-quarters of U.S. adults have used a grill — yet, grilling sparks more than 10,000 home fires on

average each year. To avoid this, the Red Cross offers these grilling safety tips:

Always supervise a barbecue grill when in use. Don't add charcoal starter fluid when coals have already been ignited.

Never grill indoors — not in the house, camper, tent or any enclosed area.

Make sure everyone, including pets, stays away from the grill.

Keep the grill out in the open, away from the house, deck, tree branches or anything that could catch fire.

Use the long-handled tools especially made for cooking on the grill to help keep the chef safe.

Accidents and Emergencies Happen

The Red Cross has several resources to help people learn how to treat bee stings, burns and heat emergencies including online and in-person training courses, a free First Aid app and a First Aid Skill for Amazon Alexa-enabled devices.

We are pretty sure it was a Spotted Dolphin which was a first ever sighting for us.

There is a new enemy in the lawn: Ground Thistle also known as Spur Weed or Burr Grass. Seems like others in the area are seeing it for the first time also.



Getting geared up to get my local onions, Flatland Sweets, available until June 11th, and also some from across the river. I got a flat of blueberries and promptly made Blueberry Yum Yum and froze the rest. For the first time I'm fearless about freezing things and not worrying about storms thanks to the generator. I found a new app to help monitor storms: Hurricane Tracker.

We took a trip up to Swan Quarter to get some good VFD chicken BBQ and to participate in a fundraiser. Looked like all the shrimp boats were in but getting ready for the season. I found a cute purse at Mattie Arts Center. That is an amazing shop.

The Gardenias are in full bloom. My Indiana dad had a prized bush at our house in the South Carolina Sandhills and would be so proud of it. He recalled how the blooms were sought out for boutineers back in the day and would brag about how much money that bush represented.

Sunday June 6, 2021 was the 77th anniversary of the "D" Day invasion in World War II at Normandy, France.

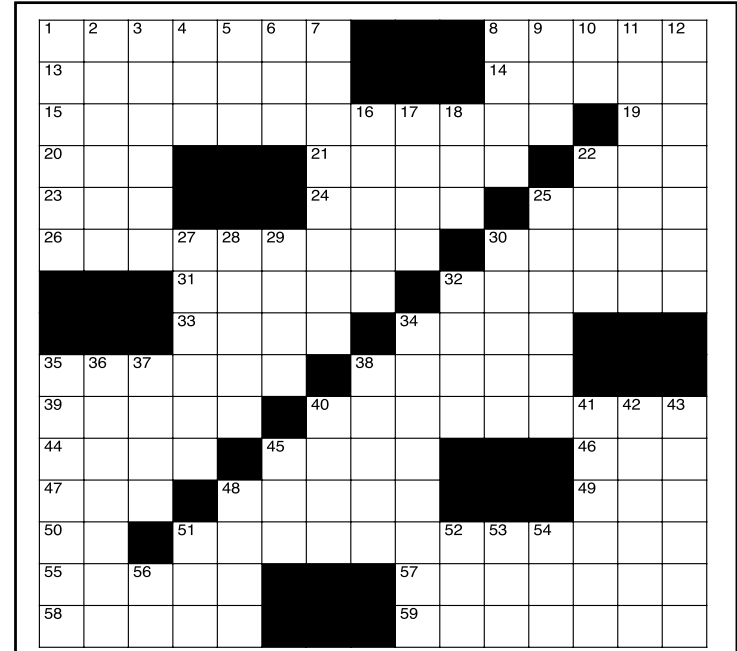
