Pamlico County man's birthday surprise to wife: \$100,000 Powerball prize Saturday's Powerball jackpot

reaches \$184 million -

RALEIGH - Jone Buadromo from Bayboro won a \$100,000 prize playing Powerball, but he delayed collecting it for almost two months because he wanted to tell his wife the good news on her birthday.

"I waited until the end of May because I wanted to surprise her on her birthday with the win," Buadromo said.

When he announced the news on his wife's birthday, he said she didn't initially believe him.

"She thought I was making a joke or something," Buadromo laughed. "I told her, 'No we really won."

Buadromo's \$3 Power Play ticket matched numbers on four white balls and the Powerball in the April 11 drawing to win \$50,000. His prize doubled to \$100,000 when the 2X multiplier hit.

"I didn't believe it at first either," he said. "I just tried to keep calm as much as possible."

Buadromo, 72, purchased his ticket from the Handy Mart on N.C. 55 in Alliance. He claimed his prize Thursday at lottery headquarters and, after required federal and state tax withholdings, took home \$71,011.

Buadromo said he is considering using his winnings to buy some land at the beach and possibly build a rental home.







Crypto: Investment or speculation?



With cryptocurrencies so much in the news, you might be wondering if you should invest in them. But "invest" may not be the right word - because, in many ways, cryptocurrencies, or "crypto" for short, are more speculation than investment.

But what's really the difference between a spec-

ulator and an investor? Probably the main factor is the differing views of time. A true investor is in it for the long term, building a portfolio that, over many years, can eventually provide the financial resources to achieve important goals, such as a comfortable retirement. But speculators want to see results, in the form of big gains, right now - and they're often willing to take big risks to achieve these outcomes.

There's also the difference in knowledge. Investors know that they're buying shares of stock in a company that manufactures products or provides services. But many speculators in cryptocurrency don't fully comprehend what they're buying - because crypto just isn't that easy to understand. Cryptocurrency is a digital asset, and cryptocurrency transactions only exist as digital entries on a blockchain, with the "block" essentially being just a collection of information, or digital ledgers. But even knowing this doesn't necessarily provide a clear picture to many of those entering the crypto world.

In addition to time and understanding, two other elements help define cryptocurrency's speculative nature:

• Volatility - Cryptocurrencies are subject to truly astonishing price swings, with big gains followed by enormous losses sometimes within a matter of hours. What's behind this type of volatility? Actually, several factors are involved. For one thing, the price of Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies depends heavily

on supply and demand - and the demand can skyrocket when media outlets and crypto "celebrities" tout a particular offering. Furthermore, speculators will bet on crypto prices moving up or down, and these bets can trigger a rush on buying and selling, again leading to the rapid price movements. And many purchasers of crypto, especially young people, want to see big profits quickly, so when they lose large amounts, which is common, they often simply quit the market, contributing to the volatility.

• Lack of regulation - When you invest in the traditional financial markets, your transactions are regulated by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), and the firms with which you invest are typically overseen by the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA). Other agencies are also involved in regulating various investments. These regulating bodies work to ensure the basic fairness of the financial markets and to prevent and investigate fraud. But cryptocurrency exchanges are essentially unregulated, and this lack of oversight has contributed to the growth of "scam" exchanges, crypto market manipulation, excessive trading fees and other predatory practices. This "Wild West" scenario should be of concern to anyone putting money in crypto.

The cryptocurrency market is still relatively new, and it's certainly possible that, in the future, crypto can become more of an investment and less of a speculation. In fact, Congress is actively considering ways to regulate the cryptocurrency market. But for now, caveat emptor - "let the buyer beware."

This year my anticipation for the summ



PCC's Student of the Year on track to earn bachelor's degree early

When it comes to her education, Christy Novajosky is all business.

The 19-year-old Bridgeton woman earned four dozen hours of transferable college credit by taking tuition-free college-level courses from Pamlico Community College while she was still a high school student at Arapahoe Charter School.

After graduating in 2021, she enrolled at PCC to continue her education, compiling a remarkable 68 transferable college credits and earning her Associate in Arts degree, which she received earlier this Spring.

Now a full-time student at Appalachian State University, Novajosky plans to take courses in both Summer terms at the Boone university, even as she works as an intern at First Citizens Bank in New Bern.

Through all of these efforts, Novajosky is scheduled to earn her Bachelor's degree in Business Administration from ASU in May 2023 – a full two years early. She also was named PCC's Academic Excellence Award recipient and the college's Student of the Year for 2022 earlier this year.

"Without this (N.C. Career & College Promise) program, I would be on my first year at Appalachian State University as a freshman, instead of transferring in this Spring 2022 semester as a Junior with 68 credits," Novajosky wrote recently. "This opportunity has saved me several thousand dollars and has set me ahead of others my age. The money and time saved will help me complete my Bachelor's degree sooner and begin my journey into the workforce."

PCC President Dr. Jim Ross said Novajosky's experience shows what the N.C. Career & College Promise program and a strong work ethic can do for students.

"Christy Novajosky shows the type of opportunities available for motivated students at Pamlico Community College," he said. "She has worked extremely hard, maximizing her time in high school and at PCC. It was an honor for us to recognize all of her successes – her awards and her degree – at graduation."

During the May 13 Commencement ceremony, Vice President of Student Services Jamie Gibbs presented Novajosky with a plaque and a medallion for her award. As the recipient of the Academic Excellence Award, she becomes Pamlico's 2022 honoree in the N.C. Community College System's "Great within the 58" list of high-achieving students.

In nominating Novajosky for the Academic Excellence Award, Instructor Dr. Rebecca Pesko wrote, "This year's recipient was a leader in engaging in class discussions and was always proactive and very thorough in all assignments they submitted."

Novajosky said she has been interested in the business world for a long time. She hopes to focus on finance, with the goal of becoming a financial analyst or advisor. Her lifelong strength in math has also been a help, she said.



COASTAL LIVING All Paws Aboard! Tips for Safe Boating with Your Pet



With boating season ramping up, it's a good time to talk about best practices for pet-friendly boating to ensure your little one is safe. Before hitting the lake, river or sea with your pet, it's important to plan ahead and always keep the best interests of your fourlegged first mate in mind.

Boating with your pet can be a wonderful and bonding experience with proper planning and preparation. Ensure your pet's boat cruise is a happy and safe one with these tips.

Familiarization with the boat

It is best to gradually introduce your pet to your boat and the water. Let your pet explore the boat while it is docked before going out on the water. Turn on the engine and let him get used to its sound, smell, and feel while the boat is docked. Then, take your pet out on small cruises and gradually build up to longer cruises.

Safe & easy boat access

Provide a special pet ramp for your pet to get on and off the boat. This not only includes from the dock to the boat but also from the water to the boat. Pets weigh much more wet than dry and it can be very difficult to lift them back into your boat after a swim.

Personal flotation device

A personal flotation device (a.k.a. pet life jacket) can also ensure safety while on the water. Not all pets can swim (including some dogs). Even if your pet is a good swimmer, getting tossed overboard can put any animal into a panic. In addition, your pet could suffer from exhaustion or hypothermia. Many pets also fall into the water from the dock or while trying to get from the dock to the boat. Having your pet equipped with a personal flotation device (PFD) with a lifting handle makes retrieving your pet much easier and safer. Help your pet get used to the PFD by first practicing at home for short periods of time. Start by putting the PFD on your pet and let him walk around with it on. The next step is to let your pet swim with it on for a short period. It's a new experience for your pet so it's important for him to get used to it before the boat trip.

your cat's litter box and securing it inside the cabin is a good solution for your feline sailors. Dogs, however, are a bigger challenge. If your boat trip does not allow for regular land stops for your dog to do his business, then provisions must be made so that he can relieve himself on the boat. A few popular options are por-

Sun protection

Pets are not immune to sunburn or skin cancers. Be sure to pack pet sunscreen and apply it regularly to protect your pet from the severe effects of the sun.

Health records

If your boating destination is a marina or place that you're not familiar with, be sure to bring along a copy of vaccination and health records. Some places may require proof of immunization before letting pets explore on land. **Call ahead**

Proper hydration & staying cool

Pets do not sweat, so keep an eye out for heavy panting or drool and a rapid heart beat. Protect pets from heat by providing some shade on the boat, providing plenty of water and keeping the deck cool to protect paw pads. Bring along a pet travel bowl and fresh water. It is critical to hydrate pets before they get into the water. Otherwise, they will drink the natural water and may get ill. **Avoid full bellies**

Even if your pet is well acclimated to boating, the rolling waves, choppy current, and diesel fuel odor can lead to dreaded sea sickness. It's best to keep your pet's feeding to a minimum. And when you do feed him, make sure you give him his regular kibble/treats – in small amounts.

Going potty

A big challenge of boating with your pet is making provisions so that he can go to the bathroom. Bringing along
