Did you know?

Despite its reputation as the most formidable type of mold individuals can find in their homes, black mold is similar to other indoor molds in regard to its effects on human health. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, black mold, or stachybotrys chartarum, isn't any more harmful than other types of mold, including cladosporium, penicillium, aspergillus, and alternaria. The reputation of black mold, which can look black or greenish-black, likely has something to do with its appearance. But homeowners still have reason to be fearful of mold in their homes, regardless of what color the mold may be. That's because mold can lead to a host of unwelcome health problems, including stuffy nose, sore throat, coughing or wheezing, burning eyes, or skin rash. Symptoms may be even worse for people with asthma and mold allergies.

Green receives 2022-23 President's Award at PCC

Lana Green says you never know who's watching and appreciating your work and your attitude.

Green's selection was announced during the college's Christmas luncheon in December. Ross formally presented her the award Monday on campus.

"She makes lives better every single day at our college," he said.

FINANCIAL FOCUS Are you ready to 'unretire'?



Have you recently retired but are now thinking of going back to work? If so, you aren't alone, as many people are choosing to "unretire." But if you do reenter the workforce in some capacity, what opportunities might be available to you? And how will your renewed employment affect your financial outlook?

For starters, though, what reasons might motivate you to go back to work? For many

people, the primary cause has been inflation, which has presented a huge challenge to retirees living on a fixed income. In addition, the volatile financial market of 2022 caused many people's investment portfolios to decline in value — a real problem for retirees who needed to start selling investments to supplement their income.

But non-financial factors could also be driving you to unretire. Like other retirees, you may miss the chance to use your work experience to engage with the world, and you may miss the social interactions as well.

In any case, if you do decide to rejoin the working world in some fashion, you may have several options. For example, if you enjoyed the work you did for your former employer, you might want to see if you could go back on a part-time basis. Or you could use your skills to join the "gig" economy by doing some consulting or freelance work in your former industry. You might also consider going to work for a nonprofit organization, as many of these groups lost employees during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic and are now facing labor shortages.

Going back to work, even part time, can improve your cash flow, which helps cover the cost of regular expenses.

Furthermore, the added income can possibly help you delay or reduce withdrawals from your investment accounts. And it's important to increase the longevity of these accounts considering you may spend two, or even three, decades in retirement. (Once you turn 72, however, you will have to start withdrawing certain amounts from your 401(k) and traditional IRA.) But your earnings can affect another source of your retirement income — your Social Security benefits.

If you return to work before your "full" retirement age, which is likely between 66 and 67, the Social Security earnings limit in 2023 is \$21,240. For each \$2 earned over that amount, Social Security will deduct \$1 from benefits. If you reach your full retirement age in 2023, the earnings limit is \$56,520; Social Security will deduct \$1 from your benefits for each \$3 earned over this amount until the month you turn your full retirement age. But in all future years after you've reached your full retirement age, you can earn as much as you want without losing any benefits. Social Security will then recalculate your payments to give you credit for the months your benefits were reduced or withheld due to your excess earnings. Be aware, though, that your earned income can potentially result in higher taxes on your Social Security benefits at any age.

Returning to work can be rewarding, both financially and emotionally. And you may get more out of the experience when you're aware of the issues involved.

Growing & Pruning Muscadine Grapes

Pruning grape vines is a seasonal chore that helps to produce an abundant crop for many years. Vines left to grow unchecked will produce excessive vegetative growth that eventually becomes unproductive. Pruning provides a balance between fruiting wood and foliage that results in larger fruit of greater quality. December

through early February is an excellent time to prune muscadines, so let's discuss muscadine production and offer a few suggestions for proper pruning.

Grapes typically grown in Eastern NC are muscadine varieties, either bronze-green in color, sometimes referred to as Scuppernong, or dark purple varieties known for their sweetness. These grapes have their own distinct flavor, thick skins, and seeds. Popular muscadine varieties include 'Carlos', 'Nesbit', and 'Noble'. Other grape varieties are classified as bunch grapes and include native Fox grapes and wine grapes. Bunch grape varieties are typically grown in Piedmont and Mountain regions, as Pierce's disease, prevalent in the East, can shorten the lifespan of bunch grapes. If you wish to try growing bunch grapes in Pamlico County, you may have limited success. Be conservative in your planting and follow recommended management practices found in this Extension publication titled 'Bunch Grapes in the Home Garden' at https://content.ces.ncsu.edu/bunch-grapes-inthe-home-garden. Our NC State Extension Small Fruit Specialist has produced an excellent video on growing grapes, which can also be found at https://youtu.be/g0ogX7ZHeb8. As for muscadines, pruning and management is easier than bunch grapes. The best growing site for grapes is a sunny location with good internal drainage. Wetness is the greatest limiting factor in Pamlico County. If your soil has standing water after a rain, then either choose another site or consider creating a raised planting site. Training of grapes is important, and the standard single wire trellis system is recommended for home growers. With this system, plants are planted between two poles, spaced 20' apart, with a single wire stretched between each pole. This allows for the formation of two permanent fruiting arms that stretch outwardly towards your poles. These arms are maintained throughout the life of the planting, and from here all the fruiting wood is formed. All fruit is born on 1-year old wood, so pruning is used to reduce the excessive 1-year old wood that grew the previous season and leave enough wood to bear the new season crop.

Start your pruning efforts by identifying 1-year old wood, which typically has smooth bark, lighter color and contains buds. These buds are what you are trying to remove, but also what will produce new growth and fruit. The closer this new growth occurs to the permanent arm, the more productive it will be. Prune back vigorous growth towards these arms, leaving about 7-8 buds per shoot. This will help to create a balanced number of buds along the length of the vine that will maximize production.

December through February is a good time to prune muscadine vines, but any time after leaf fall and before buds begin growth in the spring is acceptable. "Bleeding" of water from pruning cuts may occur, but this is not a cause for concern. Remove old canes that you pruned and perform a general cleanup of the grape vine by raking fallen leaves and old fruit. If old diseased fruit remains



around the vine, this can be a source of infection for the new season. Muscadines are tolerant of most pests and diseases and general sanitation from year to year is usually all that is needed to maintain healthy vines. Fertilize mature vines in March with about one pound of 10-10-10 scattered around the vine, but no closer than 21-inches from the vine. Another application in June may be needed if growth is slow. If vine growth appears vigorous or exceeds 3-4 feet of growth during the season, reduce your fertilizer rate. Remove weeds and turf from under vines to reduce competition and water when needed.

The muscadine grapes' thick skin is what contributes to their higher fiber content. Twenty grapes contain nearly 5 grams of fiber, which is significantly more than the amount of fiber you'll find in red or green European grapes, which have 1 gram of fiber.

Eating muscadine grapes can help you reach the recommended amount of dietary fiber, which is 14 grams for every 1,000 calories per day — or between 25 to 38 grams daily, according to the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics.

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cause the virus mutates easily, researchers continue to develop new vaccines to help boost defense against it. WASHINGTON – The Internal Revenue Service reminds low- and moderate-income workers that they can save for retirement now and possibly earn a special tax credit in 2022 and years ahead.

The Retirement Savings Contributions Credit, also known as the Saver's Credit, helps offset part of the first \$2,000 workers voluntarily contribute to Individual Retirement Arrangements, 401(k) plans and similar workplace retirement programs. The credit also helps any eligible person with a disability who is the designated beneficiary of an Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) account, contribute to that account. For more information about ABLE accounts, see Publication 907, available on IRS.gov.

The Saver's Credit is available in addition to any other tax savings that apply.

Still time to take action

Eligible workers still have time to make qualifying retirement contributions and get the Saver's Credit on their 2022 tax return. People have until April 18, 2023 - the due date for filing their 2022 return - to set up a new IRA or add money to an existing IRA for 2022. Both Roth and traditional IRAs gualify.

On the other hand, those participating in workplace retirement plans must take action by the end of 2022 for contributions to count for this year. This means elective deferrals (contributions) must be made by December 31 to a:

- 401(k) plan.
- 403(b) plan for employees of public schools and certain tax-exempt organizations.
- Governmental 457 plan for state or local government employees.
- Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) for federal employees.

Contributions to certain other workplace retirement plans also qualify. See the instructions to Form 8880 for details.

Employees unable to set aside money this year may want to schedule their 2023 contributions soon so their employer can begin withholding them in January.

Who qualifies

Income limits, based on a taxpayer's adjusted gross income and marital or filing status, apply to the Saver's Credit. But due to inflation, the limits will increase markedly in 2023.

As a result, the Saver's Credit can be claimed by:

- Married couples filing jointly with incomes up to \$68,000 in 2022 or \$73,000 in 2023.
- Heads of household with incomes up to \$51,000 in 2022 or \$54,750 in 2023.
- Married individuals filing separately and singles with incomes up to \$34,000 in 2022 or \$36,500 in 2023.

Like other tax credits, the Saver's Credit can increase a taxpayer's refund or reduce the tax owed. Though the maximum Saver's Credit is \$1,000 (\$2,000 for married couples), the IRS cautioned that it is often much less and, due in part to the impact of other deductions and credits, may, in fact, be zero for some taxpayers.

A taxpayer's credit amount is based on their filing status, adjusted gross income, tax liability and amount contributed to qualifying retirement programs or ABLE accounts. Form 8880 is used to claim the Saver's Credit, and its instructions have details on figuring the credit correctly. In tax year 2020, the most recent year for which complete figures are available, Saver's Credits totaling more than \$1.7 billion were claimed on about 9.4 million individual income tax returns. That's an average of about \$186 per eligible return.

The Saver's Credit supplements other tax benefits available to people who set money aside for retirement. For example, most workers may deduct their contributions to a traditional IRA. Though Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, qualifying withdrawals, usually after retirement, are tax-free. Normally, contributions to 401(k) and similar workplace plans are not taxed until withdrawn.

Some restrictions apply

Other special rules that apply to the Saver's Credit include:

- Eligible taxpayers must be at least 18 years of age.
- Anyone claimed as a dependent on someone else's return cannot take the credit.
- A student cannot take the credit. A person enrolled as a full-time student during any part of 5 calendar months during the year is considered a student.

Any distributions from a retirement plan or ABLE account reduce the contribution amount used to figure the credit. For 2022, this rule applies to distributions received after 2019 and before the due date, including extensions, of the 2022 return. Form 8880 and its instructions have details on making this computation.
