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Spectrum Launches Gigabit Broadband, Mobile, TV And Voice **Services In Pamlico** County

(Feb. 6, 2024) -Spectrum, the #1 rural internet provider in the nation*, today announced the launch of Spectrum Internet, Mobile, TV and Voice services to more than 100 homes and small businesses in Pamlico County. Spectrum's newly constructed fiber-optic network buildout in Pamlico County is part of the company's approximately \$5 billion RDOF-related investment in unserved rural communities, partly offset by \$1.2 billion in the Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) RDOF auction.

The company's RDOF expansion will provide broadband access to 1.3 million customer locations across 24 states in the coming years. Spectrum has also won more than \$700 million in state broadband expansion subsidies, which, combined with Spectrum investment, will connect another 300,000 homes and small businesses.

"Spectrum is bringing gigabit broadband to unserved communities in North Carolina and across America through RDOF," said Tim Williams, Vice President of Construction at Spectrum. "Our investment is making it possible to deliver the high-value broadband, mobile, TV and voice services now available in Pamlico County. We are providing local residents and small businesses superior connectivity at highly competitive prices, backed by a team of skilled local technicians and 100% U.S.-based customer service." Broadband speeds up to 1 Gbps, plus money-saving Mobile options and 85,000 On Demand choices Spectrum Internet delivers speeds up to 1 Gbps and Advanced WiFi for residential and small business customers, featuring starting speeds of 300 Mbps, with no modem fees, data caps or contracts. Spectrum Business Internet offers customers 1 Gbps download speeds, with 300 Mbps and 600 Mbps options. The company has also begun a network evolution that will provide gigabit upstream speeds and multiple gigabit download speeds across its entire 41-state service area. "I am thankful for the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund, which has enabled providers like Spectrum to supply high-speed internet access to rural communities across the state," said U.S. Rep. Friends of the Pamlico County **Public Library Signs Contract for** Construction of New Library and

Community Center



(Bayboro, NC, February 12, 2024) - The Friends of the Pamlico County Public Library (www.pamlicofol. org) announced that they have signed a contract with the Waters Contracting Company (Bogue, NC) (www.waterscontracting.net/) for construction of a new library and community center to be located in Alliance, NC. The general construction contract, valued at \$2.2 million, was awarded following a competitive bid process and over five years of fund-raising by the FOL and many library stakeholders. The project will be managed by the New Bern-based architecture and engineering firm, The Walker Group Architecture, Inc. (www.wgarc.com); the firm also finalized architectural and engineering plans for the project and facilitated the bid process.

"Today's libraries are centers for learning and connecting," said FOL president Bonnie Cap, explaining that the 10,000 sq ft facility will be a multipurpose space with services and programs to enrich the lives of today's and tomorrow's Pamlico County residents. The new library, to be built by repurposing and expanding an abandoned commercial building, will house a 36,000+ collection of books, audio recordings, maps, etc. Other features will include: common space and individual meeting rooms; technology resources such as computer and internet access; a business center; multi-generational reading rooms; and, an internet café. The library's design leverages

the latest in energy efficient technologies, IT infrastructure and tools, and workspace optimization. With flexible wall configurations, a fully equipped kitchen, multiple restroom facilities, and plans for back-up water and power, the new space can serve as a community gathering space during emergencies such as hurricanes.

Katherine Clowers, director of the Craven-Pamlico Regional Library (CPRL) system, emphasized that this unique partnership between the FOL and CPRL will benefit not only Pamlico County residents but the entire region. "Multipurpose libraries help build strong, resilient communities by boosting literacy rates, affording equal access to resources to help bridge the socioeconomic gap, and increasing opportunities for ongoing education, community engagement, and entrepreneurism."

The planned closure of the current library in less than 2 years, with no plan other than FOL's to replace it, makes construction of the proposed library and community center more urgent than ever.

Preparing for Lent and Easter

Cousins transition from military careers to electrical work

Two area men who served the country in uniform are successfully transitioning to rewarding careers in electrical work with a little help from Pamlico Community College.

First cousins Mike Mills, 43, and Justin Mills, 34, say they are attracted to work installing and servicing electrical wiring and equipment because of the earning potential and the opportunity to work with their hands.

Both men sought to improve their prospects by enrolling in the college's Electrical Systems Technology program.

Mike Mills, who served 20 years in the U.S. Coast Guard, graduated from the program in 2022 and is now working to secure his state electrical license. Justin Mills, who spent 15 years in the U.S. Army, is enrolled in the program now.

Both men also work with electricity on side jobs now, most recently electrical equipment at a residential construction site in Pamlico County.

"I knew I wanted to get in the construction trades when I got out of the Coast Guard," said Mike Mills. "The electrical program gave me a good baseline. Work allows me to apply what I've learned."

The college's Electrical Systems Technology program trains students to install and maintain electrical and electronics systems found in homes, businesses and industrial sites.

Coursework, most of which is hands-on, includes topics such as AC/DC theory, basic wiring practices, programmable logic controllers, industrial motor controls, applications of the

National Electric Code and other subjects.

Students can earn a two-year Associate of Applied Science degree, and there are certificate options available.

Like his cousin, Justin Mills knew he wanted a hands-on career after his military service. His father is a licensed electrician, which helped him narrow his focus.

Justin Mills said aspects of working with electricity reminded him of his Army job as a jumpmaster and his work as an EMT: You must follow rules and adhere to important guidelines or people get hurt – or worse.

Both men said PCC's Electrical Systems Technology program taught them how to troubleshoot malfunctioning systems and to solve problems. Those skills are handy, particularly as plans change and evolve during residential construction, Mike Mills said.

Justin Mills adds the skills learned in the program also help when you

discover wiring and switches that have been installed incorrectly. The Mills cousins encourage men and women who think they might be interested in the field to enroll in the program and see what it takes to work with electricity.

Getting High Speed Internet Can be a Slow Process

High speed Internet. We have been hearing for quite some time from politicians in Washington and Raleigh that a priority is getting unserved or underserved rural areas of our state hooked up with Broadband internet service. While it is taking a while, it appears that many Pamlico County households are stepping closer to the reality of high-speed internet thanks to the implementation of several grant programs. One of these is the GREAT (Growing Rural Economies with Access to Technology) Grant Program which Pamlico County has been participating in since 2019. "Every opportunity we have had to apply for tap into. The next step to expand broadband in the County is GREAT grant funding, we have done," says County Manager Tim Buck. "The State has only released these funds a little at a time, but we are now starting to see work actually being done on the infrastructure to provide broadband to identified locations." The program provides state funded grants to private broadband providers. Counties are allowed to provide matching funds. Pamlico County has partnered on 3 Great Grants that have awarded over \$6.1 million in funding with a County match of nearly \$350,000. These grants have gone to Centurylink (before they became Brightspeed), Spectrum, and Brightspeed to expand broadband service to almost 1500 locations in Pamlico County. In the GREAT Grant Program, the private provider selects the locations to be served by the program based on criteria specified by the State. So, why should tax dollars be used to fund private companies to provide service to private households? In short, it is the only way it will get done. These providers are in business to make a profit and running miles of expensive fiber optic cable to serve small communities was cost prohibitive. The grant money helps get the infrastructure in place to serve these communities. To date, approximately 800 of the 1474 locations have been installed with broadband fiber capabilities. The Spectrum project is in the final stages of permitting and construction is expected to start within the 1st quarter of 2024. "From the awarding of



the grant to the completion of construction by the private provider is about a 24-month process," according to Buck. The high-speed internet won't just help individuals stream movies and access YouTube "how to"

videos, it should also be of great help to the County economically as well. "We often hear of businesses and individuals who work out of their home that would like to locate here but high-speed internet was a requirement to do so," says Buck. While the GREAT grant program is well underway, it is not the only grant funding Pamlico County is seeking to

to participate in the CAB (Completing Access to Broadband) Program. The CAB Program is a State program in the initial stages of implementation and requires the County to issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) and provide matching funds. On January 2, 2024, the Board of County Commissioners approved matching funds for the CAB Program up to \$600,000 using ARPA revenue replacement funds. Soon, the County expects to begin developing an RFP with the State to identify eligible locations and solicit private providers to construct new broadband infrastructure utilizing CAB funding. The CAB program will use FCC mapping data to identify unserved/underserved locations at the household level. Any location with less than 100 megabytes of download speed will be an eligible project location. If this alphabet soup of terms and programs seems confusing, you are not alone, but Buck emphasizes one thing, "Patience. In the future Pamlico County intends to continue partnering with State, Federal and private entities to expand broadband service in Pamlico County. This includes participating in future Great and Cab Rounds." For residents wondering if their location is among those currently identified for service, a great resource is the website, www.nconemap.gov/pages/broadband where it is possible to zoom in and get information at the individual household level, that is of course if you have the internet speed to load it up.

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FINANCIAL FOCUS Avoid tapping into retirement savings early

If you want to make a big purchase, such as a new car or a piece of property, or you were faced with a large, unexpected expense, such as a major home or auto repair, would you have the funds readily available? If not, you might look at what may be your biggest pool of money — your 401(k) or IRA. But should you tap into these accounts well before you retire?

Maybe not — and here's why:

• *Less money in retirement* – The more money you invest in your retirement accounts, and the longer you keep it invested, the more you'll probably have when you need it most — when you're retired. Consequently, taking out sizable amounts from these accounts before you retire could be costly, as it would disrupt the benefits of compounding that can be achieved by holding investments for the long term.

• *Possible bump into higher tax bracket* – The money you take out from your traditional IRA and 401(k) is taxable in the year of withdrawal. So, if you withdraw a significant amount of money at once from your traditional IRA or 401(k), you could be pushed into a higher tax bracket, at least for one year.

• *Tax penalties* – If you take money out of a 401(k) or traditional IRA before you turn 59½, you could face a 10% tax penalty, although some exceptions exist. Penalty-free withdrawals can be made for several reasons, including for education and medical expenses, first-time purchase of a home (up to \$10,000), after the birth or adoption of a child (up to \$5,000) and more (see irs.gov/ taxtopics/tc557). With a Roth IRA, which is funded with after-tax dollars, you can withdraw contributions — but not earnings — at any time, for any purpose, without incurring penalties. Given these issues, how can you avoid dipping into your retirement accounts when you're faced with a financial need?

One possibility is to take out a loan from your 401(k). Unlike a 401(k) withdrawal, a loan is neither taxable nor subject to tax penalties. Also, the interest you pay on a 401(k) loan goes back into your account. Still, a 401(k) loan has its drawbacks. If you leave your job, you'll likely have to repay the loan in a short period of time and if you don't have all the money to repay it, the loan will be considered in default, so you'll owe taxes and the 10% penalty if you're younger than 59½. But even if you don't leave your job and you do repay the loan, you'll still have taken away money that could have potentially kept growing within your tax-deferred account. As mentioned above, as your money compounds, you'll want to minimize disruptions.

Building an emergency fund is another way to gain access to cash. Such a fund should contain at least six months' worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account. It can take time to build a fund of this size, so it's never too soon to start putting away money for it. To avoid the temptation of dipping into your emergency fund, you'd ideally keep this fund separate from your daily spending accounts.

Explore all your options before tapping into your IRA or 401(k) early. Keeping these accounts intact as long as possible is one of the best moves you can make to help build your future retirement income.

Now you might be thinking that's a lot of chicks, why on earth were that many chickens brought to the schools and kids? What are the benefits of so many chickens. It wasn't for the many, many benefits that small backyard and local flocks bring to the community.

4-H Agent (Though we can talk about that!) Friday was the kick off of the coastal plains 4-H Chicken Show.

The Coastal Plains Chicken Show is an annual youth program that gives youth the opportunity to learn all about poultry and poultry care. It is a great introduction to livestock Agriculture. Chickens are easy to raise, and can be kept in most places. This year youth will be raising laying chickens. During this project our youth will develop skills in the proper care of chickens through the various stages of development. They will learn how to safely water their chicks when they are very young to prevent them from drowning. They will also learn the best methods to provide proper nutrition for birds to grow. Along with all of these



practical skills youth will be developing skills in personal responsibility, prioritization, and time management.

As exciting as raising chickens is, and developing life skills like responsibility and time management is learning how to show chickens! After all it is a chicken show. Youth will raise their chicken to the best of their ability but the show is where they show it off to their best advantage.

First and for most is ensuring that all birds are healthy and meet state and federal regulations for safe transport. Another important step to showing chickens is proper grooming. Grooming? Yes! Show chickens get baths. Bathing chickens is a three-step process, which should take place two days before the show. The first step is a bath in warm sudsy water, then rinse in apple cider vinegar which helps the chickens dry and adds a shine to their feathers, and finally a rinse in warm water. Chickens should also have their feet carefully brushed with a soft toothbrush.

The most important aspect of showing chickens starts from the moment 4-Hers get their chickens. Youth work with their chicks so that on the day of the show, their chicken is calm and easily handled. A chicken should be carried with the arm beneath the chicken so that the chicken's head is tucked into the crook of the arm. The chicken will also be put through several different poses during the show to exhibit the chicken's wingspan, keel, feet and tail. The tail will also have to be flexed up and down in order to show off its carriage. It is very important for the bird to remain calm throughout these various poses.

We are looking forward to seeing all the hard work of these youth come to fruition at the coastal plains chicken show on May 9th. We are also looking forward to several up coming programs. Our Sew Much Fun Spring series will begin on March 26th. We will also be kicking of our Presentations Program on March 18th. We are very excited for these programs. But we are also looking forward to 4-H Summer Fun!

We have also opened registration for our Summer 2024 4-H Sleep away Camp. 4-H Sleep away camp is a wonderful opportunity to develop life skills. They will spend a week kayaking, swimming, hiking, navigating ropes courses, and making crafts. While they are enjoying aloof those activities they will be developing problem solving skills, growing in communication, and interpersonal skills. Further participating in 4-H sleep away camp has shown to have a positive impact on youth feelings of connection and belonging that many campers feel. We will be heading off to camp July 28th and returning August 2nd. Camp is open to youth ages eight to fourteen as of January 1st 2024.

Serve up something quick on busy weeknights

Few foodies would admit to using a microwave all that often. But busy weeknights call for some shortcuts, and microwaves can be a home cook's best friend on those evenings when time is of the essence.

Cooking with a microwave need not be limited to frozen dinners. Take, for example, this recipe for "Italian Pork Chops" from "Incredibly Easy Italian" (Publications International, Ltd.). Easily prepared in less than 30 minutes, this meal combines homecooking with a shortcut that can make it easy to serve a delicious, hot meal on weeknights when parents or busy professionals simply don't have much time to spend in the kitchen.

Italian Pork Chops

Serves 4

- 2 cups uncooked long-grain white rice
- 4 large pork chops
- 1 teaspoon basil, crushed

You don't have to face it alone

The term heart failure sounds like the heart is no longer working at all. Actually, heart failure, sometimes called HF, means that the heart isn't pumping as well as it should. Congestive heart failure is a type of heart failure that requires timely medical attention, although sometimes the two terms are used interchangeably.

Your body depends on the heart's pumping action to deliver oxygen- and nutrient-rich blood to the body's cells. With heart failure, the weakened heart can't supply the cells with enough blood. This results in fatigue and shortness of breath, and some people experience excessive coughing. Everyday activities such as walking, climbing stairs or carrying groceries can become very difficult.

Heart failure is a term used to describe a heart that cannot keep up with its workload. The body may not get the oxygen it needs.

Heart failure is a serious condition, and usually there's no cure. But many people with heart failure lead a full, enjoyable life when the condition is managed with heart failure medications and a healthy lifestyle. It's also helpful to have the support of family and friends who understand your condition.

How the normal heart works

The heart is a strong, muscular pump a little larger than a fist. Its job is to pump the right amount of blood to all parts of the body. This is called circulation.

- The heart has four chambers:
 - Two upper chambers called atria (when talking about just one, it's called an atrium)
- Two lower chambers called ventricles

The right atrium takes in oxygen-depleted blood from the rest of the body and sends it through the right ventricle to the lungs, which infuse the blood with oxygen.

Oxygen-rich blood travels from the lungs to the left atrium, then on to the left ventricle, which pumps it to the rest of the body.

The heart pumps blood to the lungs and to all of the body's tissues. For the heart to work properly, the four chambers must beat in an organized way. A healthy heart has more than enough pumping ability to circulate blood properly.

What is heart failure?

Heart failure is a lifelong condition in which the heart muscle can't pump enough blood to meet the body's needs for blood and oxygen. Basically, the heart can't keep up with its work-load.

At first the heart tries to make up for this by:

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- * Forklift Training, One-day class Feb. 24!

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- Enlarging. The heart stretches to contract more strongly and keep up with the body's demand to pump more blood. Over time, this causes the heart to enlarge.
- Developing more muscle mass. The increase in muscle mass occurs because the contracting cells of the heart get bigger. This lets the heart pump more strongly, at least initially.
- Pumping faster. This helps increase the heart's output.

The body also tries to compensate in other ways:

- The blood vessels narrow to keep blood pressure up, trying to make up for the heart's loss of power.
- The kidneys retain more salt and water rather than excrete it through urine. This creates increased volume of blood, which helps to maintain blood pressure and allows the heart to pump stronger. But over time this extra volume can overtask the heart, making heart failure worse.

These temporary measures mask the problem of heart failure, but they don't solve it. Heart failure continues and worsens until these compensating processes no longer work.

Eventually the heart and body simply can't keep up, and the person experiences fatigue, breathing problems or other symptoms that usually prompt a trip to the doctor.

The body's compensation mechanisms help to explain why some people might not become aware of their condition until years after their heart begins its decline. (That is a good reason to have a regular checkup with your doctor.)

Heart failure can involve the heart's left side, right side or both sides. However, it usually affects the left side first. Read more about the types of heart failure.

INTO THE BURNING SEA-THE GREATEST COAST GUARD RESCUE IN AMERICAN HISTORY NEW BERN HISTORICAL SOCIETY HOSTS AUTHOR, HISTORIAN KEVIN DUFFUS



tanker, Mirlo, loaded with nearly 300,000 gallons of aviation fuel was five miles east of the Outer Banks village of Rodanthe on August 16, 1918, when it was torpedoed by the Germans. their exploding and burning ship.

Entering a hellish and deadly inferno of explosions and toxic fumes, they bravely navigated a confusing maze of swirling black smoke to rescue strangers in distress. It was a day when American lifesaving history was made. In an emotional coda to the Mirlo story, three years after his book was published Duffus received an amazing letter from a woman in England named Mirlo, the granddaughter of the third officer of the tanker. His personal eyewitness account in a series of letters revealed a previously unknown and astonishing perspective of the catastrophe. When Duffus reads the heart-wrenching letters of the British sailor and his granddaughter, the lessons of history and the true essence of the lifesavers' legacy becomes evident.

Apparently this is going to be a big year for Cicadas in the state, but not around here. I love the sound one makes when being chased by a bird. The Cattails are shedding and I had pancakes made from them at a teacher inservice once. Two otters came out on the dock the other day. One was eating (and eating) a fish on the bottom step while a younger one wandered around. There, Äôs a Great Egret hunting by the road next to a flooded area near the ferry landing. Lines of Cormorants are cruising the creek.

Hyde County has possession of the Mattamuskeet Lodge and has big plans for its rejuvenation. The county, Äôs Extension Agency is planning to house there.

The Great Backyard Bird Count is coming up February 16-19. You ought to participate and can go to https://www. birdcount.org for more information.

I understand the water in the Atlantic is now the temperature of typical June. Hope that doesn, Äôt foretell of a bad storm season.
