Don't Get Burned by a Summer Scam

Scams, or whatever you'd like to call them, have pretty much been around as long as there has been someone willing to try to take something

of value from someone else by deception. You could say that the devil perpetrated a scam on Eve when he convinced her to take a bite of the apple in the garden of Eden. Many old western movies depicted a "snakeoil" salesman, a well-dressed gentleman hawking bottles of colored sugar water guaranteed to cure nearly any ailment and as a bonus, remove stubborn stains from clothing. In more recent times, we have had Prince Akamumbae. The benevolent Prince, a member of the displaced Nigerian royal family, sent many emails offering to share his billions with you. All he required was to know a few facts about you including your bank account number where he would deposit a portion of his riches. This type of scam still exists today, and is still stealing from unsuspecting victims. They have however become much more sophisticated and can come through emails, text messages, snail mail, or direct phone calls. Many rely on personal information hackers have already obtained about you, or that you have unwittingly given to them yourself. Simple questions that are asked on social media sites which will claim to tell you what kind of dog you would be if you were one, or what the perfect mate would be for you, seem innocent enough, but can contain inquisitions which reveal much about you, perhaps even passwords to your accounts. Anyone can be targeted, but unfortunately older adults are increasingly the victims of these scams. According to the National Council on Aging, in 2022, there were

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Twenty area middle-schoolers enjoy PCC's STEM-themed day camp

Twenty area middle school students enjoyed hands-on learning opportunities, field trips and fun last week at Pamlico Community College's Environmental Camp 2024.

The group of rising sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders visited Cape Lookout, the Queen Anne's Revenge lab at East Carolina University the picturesque Latham-Whitehurst Nature Park near Bridgeton and the Cool Springs Environmental Education Area near Ernul.

On campus, the students learned about animals' skeletons, droppings and tracks, and participated in other activities designed to get them excited about Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM).

"We were very busy," said Derek Godwin, the college's director of Career & College Promise and a key organizer of the event. "We had a great group of students, and they got to see a lot of interesting things."

A generous \$5,000 grant from the STEM East Network made it possible for the college to offer the day camp.

Along with Godwin, PCC Environmental Science Technology Instructor Zac Schnell oversaw most of last week's activities. They

They were joined at the camp by Interim President Michelle Willis-Krauss, Director of Institutional Effectiveness Brandy Leder, college staffers Starr Murphy and Tanya Banks, and others.

Before the COVID-19 pandemic, the college had offered similar day camps for middle schoolers, including in 2018 and 2019. Pamlico has been able to restart the effort in large part because it has joined other area community colleges in the STEM East Network, which is a Greenville-based consortium of schools, colleges, employers, state and local governments and others designed to enhance STEM learning opportunities that align with jobs available in Eastern North Carolina.

By participating in the STEM East Network, which is an initiative of the NC East Alliance, a regional economic development organization, Pamlico is part of a regionwide effort to expand learning opportunities for students and to grow the area's skilled workforce.



over 88,000 complaints of fraud resulting in \$3.1 billion in losses from people age 60+. Why target senior citizens? Scammers believe they have plenty of money in the bank, often aren't tech savvy, and are usually too polite to just cut off a conversation no matter how suspicious. One scam, which recently targeted an older resident of Pamlico County, is placed by phone. A frantic voice on the other end of the line, usually identifying themselves as "your grandson or granddaughter" states they have been arrested or have been in an accident and need money quickly. Sometimes another voice, pretending to be the police, a lawyer, or auto repairman, will come on the line explaining how to get the money to where it needs to be. In the case of the Pamlico County resident, a Lyft driver was sent to pick up cash. The driver, who was an unwitting accomplice to the crime, began to get suspicious. When they suggested that the gentleman contact his grandson directly it was discovered he was not in jail at all. So, how do you protect yourself from being scammed. One way to detect a scam is direct contact. If you receive a suspicious email, text, or phone call, contact the other party directly, and don't use the phone number or contact info originally supplied in the suspicious contact. According to investigator Scott Houston of the Pamlico County Sheriff's office, recognition is a key. "Unless you physically know them and see them, do not send them money." If your bank sends you an email billing you for a suspicious fee and instructing you to authorize payment, call your bank directly and find out what's going on, and make sure it gets reported to their fraud department and law enforcement authorities. Also, pay attention to suspicious emails and how they are written. Scammers often misspell words or make grammatical errors that wouldn't be in official communications. There are three very basic tips to guard against getting scammed. Guard your personnel information, monitor your accounts, and trust no one. If you think you have been a victim of a scam there is action you can take. Contact your local law enforcement or the North Carolina Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division at 1-877-5-NO-SCAM. If suspicious activity shows up on your bank or credit card statements, contact those institutions immediately. They can close the account to limit further damage and issue you a new card and account number. Often, victims feel embarrassed at being taken advantage of and don't report the scam to proper authorities. Please, if you have been victimized, speak up. You may help authorities catch the criminal, prevent someone else from being a victim, and perhaps even get your property back.

Financial tips for widows and widowers



have. Unfortunately, widows and widowers have to deal with more than just the emotional trauma — they also must consider

Dan M. Roberts a range of financial issues. If you've recently been widowed, what financial moves should you consider?

For starters, don't rush into any major decisions. If you're still in the grieving process, you are unlikely to be in the best shape to make significant choices affecting your finances and your life.

But once you feel ready to look at your situation objectively and make appropriate choices, consider the following steps:

• Review your finances. Look at your entire financial picture - your assets, investments, debts and income. If you and your spouse had communicated well about your finances, and you shared decisions, you hopefully won't encounter any big surprises. But if your spouse was the partner who mostly handled financial matters, you may need to get up to speed quickly on what you have and what you owe. And if your spouse had provided a large amount of your household income, you will also need to determine what changes you may need to make to your lifestyle.

• Address insurance issues. If you will receive a death benefit from your spouse's insurance policy, what will you do with the money? It may prove helpful in funding your own retirement or meeting other financial goals. But you'll also want to be clear about what other beneficiaries, such as your children, might receive. And while you're looking at insurance, you also might want to look at your own policies — do you need to change beneficiaries?

• Review your Social Security options. If you are at least 60 and you were married at least nine months, you may be entitled to Social Security survivor benefits. (If you remarry before age 60, you typically cannot receive survivor benefits, but you can reinstate them if this subsequent marriage ends.) The amount of your survivor's benefits depends on your age and the age of your deceased spouse. You can't claim your deceased spouse's benefits along with your own retirement benefits, so if you qualify for survivor and retirement benefits, you'll receive the larger amount. Depending on your situation, you might come out ahead by delaying your retirement benefits, giving them the chance to grow, while you accept survivor benefits. 

If I say life skills you might think: balancing a budget; cooking a meal, conflict management. Those are all important life skills, and 4-H Offers all of those! But another important life skill is sewing! Sewing is both a practical life skill, allowing youth the knowledge to customize, repair and fit their own clothes, and also serves as a creative outlet. Creativity is a key in helping youth express themselves, and reduce

stress This last week we had a Custom Clothes sewing camp. Youth spent three days designing, and constructing their own garment visions. To start with we learn about the shapes that make up a sewing pattern. Then we talk about fabric selection! Fabric selection is hugely important in garment construction. Then we start laying out fabric and outlining our patterns. This is done with tailors chalk.

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

Likely the Longest Anchoring Day of the Year BoatUS Foundation: Are you ready? BoatUS Foundation: Are you ready?



ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 24, 2024 - According to the nationwide TowBoatUS on-water towing fleet, the busiest time of the year for America's recreational boat owners is, hands down, the Fourth of July holiday period, which typically includes some days before and after the official holiday. It also may be the longest time many boaters will spend the day on the water at anchor, enjoying fireworks shows, fishing holes and raft-ups. Are they ready?

The BoatUS Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water has four tips to help boaters spend America's birthday safely at anchor.

1. Be anchor smart. Before heading out, is your anchoring gear is up to snuff? Bitter end secured? You may not have used it yet this boating season, so be sure all is good to go for whatever anchoring arrangement – a picnic hook, extra fenders for a raft-up, or shoreside tie-up requiring a second line. When arriving to your celebration spot and setting anchor, ensure you let out enough scope for the depth and predicted weather conditions. Show some courtesy if things get crowded. On the other hand, don't be that guy who runs into an anchorage throwing a wake or who is completely oblivious to those around him.

2. Avoid CO poisoning. Generators give boaters the creature comforts they want. However, don't run the generator if you've got swimmers in the water at the back of the boat - a common place for guests to congregate on floats and pool toys. This is where exhaust ports often located, spewing dangerous, odorless carbon monoxide.

3. Don't stress it. It's a long day on the water. Be careful with stressors including noise, vibration, sun, wind, waves and other motion. U.S. Coast Guard research shows that four hours of exposure to these can produce a kind of fatigue, or "boater's hypnosis," which slows reaction time almost as much as if you were legally drunk. Adding alcohol makes it worse.

For your boat, don't stress your battery playing music all day. TowBoatUS reports calls to its 24-hour dispatch for battery jump services surge - as if on cue - just after the firework shows end when boaters want to head home.

Get home safely. Before departing an anchorage, wait to turn on the engine until everyone is back aboard and ladder is up. If you're leaving a fireworks show, proceed with utmost caution. It's always better to wait a few minutes for everyone to clear out and give a chance for wakes to subside before departing. Be patient and, again, give as much courtesy as you can. Everyone aboard should be acting as a lookout. Never take a shortcut home after




Grilling is serious business in the hearts and minds of millions of people, which is perhaps the reason why individuals tend to be so devoted to their preferred method of cooking foods over an open flame. That devotion extends to the type of grill cooks use, which typically comes down to a choice between gas grills that utilize propane and charcoal grills that burn charcoal. Though the debate over which type of grill is better will likely never end, charcoal devotees insist that science is on their side. Grilling with charcoal leads to the release of an aroma compound known as guaiacol. Guaiacol is produced during the breakdown of lignin, a resin that BarbecueBros. com notes holds strands of cellulose together to form wood. As lignin breaks down, guaiacol is released, providing foods cooked over charcoal with a uniquely smoky, baconlike flavor. That unique flavor is absent from foods cooked on a gas grill, which charcoal grill enthusiasts point to as proof that their preferred method to grill meat is superior to other means.

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

Notice of Federal Consistency Review for Bureau of Ocean **Energy Management's (BOEM) Consistency Determination for** the Proposed Rule to Amend the North Atlantic Right Whale **Vessel Strike Reduction Rule**

The North Carolina Department Environmental Quality, Division of Coastal Management (DCM) hereby gives notice that public review and comment is invited on a proposed federal

The State's review of a Bureau of Ocean Energy (BOEM) Management's Consistency Determination (CD) will determine if the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA's) Marine National Fisheries Service (NMFS) Office of Protected Resources proposed amendments to the North Atlantic Right Whale Vessel Strike Reduction Rule ("speed rule") is consistent to the maximum extent practicable with the enforceable policies of North Carolina's Coastal Management Program. The proposed action includes:

- 1. modify the boundaries and timing seasonal speed restrictions of 10 knots or less (renamed as Seasonal Speed Zones or SSZs) to better align with areas characterized by elevated collision-related mortality risk:
- create a Dynamic Speed Zone (DSZ) program to implement temporary mandatory speed restrictions when whales are known to be present outside active SSZs; extend the size threshold of
- regulated vessels to include most vessels 35 ft (10.7 m) or greater in length; and
- update the speed rule's safety deviation provision. See 87 FR 46921 (August 1, 2022).

The NMFS CD explains that their proposal is due to changes that are needed to stabilize the ongoing North Atlantic right whale population decline and prevent the species' extinction. The proposed changes were designed to address the risk of ongoing lethal strikes in tender the full balance of the U.S. waters, including strike purchase price so bid in cash or events that have occurred within state coastal waters. The amendments were informed by a coastwide collision mortality risk assessment, and updated information on North Atlantic right whale distribution, vessel traffic patterns, and vessel strike mortality and serious injury events.



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

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on March 28, 2024, Virginia Electric and Power Company, d/b/a Dominion Energy North Carolina (DENC), filed an application with the Commission requesting authority to adjust and increase its rates for retail electric service in North Carolina effective May 1, 2024.

In its Application, DENC requests authority to increase its rates and charges to produce additional overall annual North Carolina base revenues of approximately \$56,623,974, an increase of approximately 22.13% over current base revenues. DENC is proposing an increase to its current base fuel revenues in the amount of \$53,833,272, while also proposing an equivalent decrease of the current fuel cost rider (Rider A). Together, the overall increase in revenues will be \$56,623,974, or approximately 14.42%.

The increase in base fuel revenues discussed above produces a new base fuel rate of \$0.034935 per kilowatt-hour that will serve as a "placeholder" until it files its annual fuel charge adjustment application in August 2024, to become effective February 1, 2025. This proposed new base fuel rate represents the sum of the current base fuel rate and the current Rider A rate. The proposed rate increase is based on a test period ending December 31, 2023, with estimates of changes to revenues, expenses, rate base, and cost of capital through June 30, 2024. DENC states that it will file supplemental testimony in August 2024 to replace the estimates with actual amounts. DENC intends to seek implementation of its proposed rates on a temporary basis, subject to refund, on November 1, 2024, under the authority of N.C. Gen. Stat. § 62-135. DENC requests that new permanent base rates become effective on and after February 1, 2025.

DENC states that the primary drivers behind its request to increase rates are the costs incurred for: (1) significant investments in generation, transmission, and distribution infrastructure that DENC has made to ensure reliability, operational excellence, and efficient service for the benefit of its North Carolina customers; (2) maintenance of the DENC nuclear fleet; (3) the significant increase of purchased power expenses; and (4) significant cost pressures from a combination of persistent inflation, high interest rates, and higher costs such as contract labor, material, and pension and other employee benefits, among other factors.

Specifically, DENC states that its request is driven by investments made since its 2019 rate case, including: (1) the addition of ten regulated solar facilities, two utility-scale battery energy storage systems, and the Coastal Virginia Offshore Wind Pilot Project; (2) investments in existing nuclear plants to ensure their continued safe, reliable, and efficient operation and in pursuing Subsequent License Renewals to ensure continued operation of these units; and (3) investments in transmission and distribution improvements to support load growth and to improve reliability.

Additionally, DENC is requesting approval of accounting orders for: (1) deferral of potential future benefits from nuclear production tax credits pursuant to the 2022 Inflation Reduction Act; (2) recognition for ratemaking purposes of certain Asset Retirement Obligation (ARO) costs in the manner that these AROs are recognized for financial and accounting purposes; and (3) a transition from amortizing coal combustion residuals (CCR) expenditures through deferral to incorporating an ongoing annual level of CCR remediation expenses in DENC's cost of service.

DENC is also proposing a new experimental small general service electric vehicle rate schedule to address, promote, and incentivize third party development and investment in electric vehicle charging; a new residential time of use rate schedule, which is intended to improve the accuracy of price signals and alignment between customer charges and usage behaviors; and revisions to DENC's Line Extension Plan in its Terms and Conditions of Service.

Further, DENC is seeking approval of a rate of return on common equity of 10.6%.

On April 15, 2024, the Commission suspended the proposed rate changes for up to 270 days from the proposed effective date of May 1, 2024, and scheduled the Application for investigation and public hearing.

The amounts shown above do not account for any change in the fuel factor to be proposed in DENC's August 2024 fuel charge adjustment filing.

The increases shown above include a proposed increase in the basic customer charge from \$10.67 to \$14.54 per month. Customers other than those on Residential Schedule 1 would experience increases in their monthly bills based upon their particular rate schedules and usage levels.

DENC also proposes to increase the basic customer charge for most small general service customers (Schedule 5) from \$18.93 to \$22.88 per month and for most large general service customers (Schedule 6P) from \$78.98 to \$108.74 per month.

PROPOSED RATE DESIGN/RATE SCHEDULE CHANGES

DENC is proposing a new experimental small general service electric vehicle rate schedule to address, promote, and incentivize third party development and investment in electric vehicle charging. In addition, DENC is proposing a new residential time of use rate schedule, which is intended to improve the accuracy of price signals and alignment between customer charges and usage behaviors.

The Commission may consider additional or alternative rate design proposals that were not included in DENC's Application and may order increases or decreases in individual rate schedules that differ from those proposed by DENC. In no event, however, will the Commission approve any increase in total revenues beyond the total increase in revenues requested by DENC.

here's no one-size-fits-all strategy when it comes to calorie consumption, and that can contribute to some confusion as adults try to achieve and maintain a healthy weight. Dietary guidelines established by the United States Department of Health and Human Services promote nutrientdense foods and beverages, but many people prefer to know how many calories they should consume each day. that's understandable, the quality of the calories consumed goes a long way toward determining how nutritious a diet is. The Cleveland Clinic notes that the DHHS guidelines have historically recommended adults 21 and over consume between 1,600 and 3,000 calories per day.
