At some point in time last week, the old Burger King restaurant received damage to it's back exterior wall. Information of what or who may have caused this is scarce to say the least, but The Pamlico News has exclusively obtained what could possibly be a photo of the destruction at the time it occurred. The anonymous supplier of the photo also reported at the time of impact the possible perpetrator yelled out "OH YEAH"! as he/she/it crashed through the wall, indicating this could be vandalism. Since the chain of custody of this photo is unknown, its authenticity cannot be verified or used in a court




Previous Arrest Photo of "Mr. Aid".



New and returning curriculum students can get a head start on the upcoming Spring 2025 semester at Pamlico Community College by enrolling now and registering for courses!

The registration period officially opened Nov. 18. PCC officials are encouraging returning students to go ahead and register for the new semester before the college's winter break begins Dec. 18.

They also are encouraging new students to start the enrollment process early so they can explore the financial aid options that might be available, including scholarships.

PCC still will conduct its usual Spring Registration period on Jan. 7, 2025, but new and returning curriculum students can avoid the new year's rush and get their courses locked in now.

Hurricane Hoops Pamlico Visits New Bern in Only Contest of Week

The Pamlico County High School basketball teams made the short trip last Tuesday to take on the Bears in what would turn out to be their only action of the week. In the ladies contest, both teams played about even through 2 1/2 quarters, but just before the half, Pamlico seized a little momentum and went into the break up 26-15. They continued that trend in the second half relying on defense to keep the Bears from establishing any sort of offense. Freshman Bella Schulz came off the bench and provided a spark with her hustle. The Lady 'Canes offense, behind Nya Clark's 25 points and Sydney Whitley-Reese's 23 continued to build the lead, up to 15 going into the 4th Quarter and finally ending with a 20-point margin, 60-40. Whitley-Reese also had 13 rebounds for a double-double. Kyliyah Barber also stood out on the night registering 10 steals. The men's squad took the floor for only the second time of the season and continued to be short-handed. This time the key member of the team out was Head Coach Nick Lewis who was given a no work order by

doctors due to sickness. The Pamlico men looked strong early and actually held a 1-point lead at the end of the first period. FINANCIAL FOCUS QCDs: Tax-friendly charitable gifts

In most walks of life, you'd probably be pleased if you could accomplish two goals with one action. That's exactly what happens when you can turn some of your retirement funds into charitable gifts that support a worthy organization while also realizing tax benefits.

Here's a little background: If you haven't already withdrawn from your traditional IRA, you must do so once you reach 73, or 75 if you

were born in 1960 or later. If you don't take these withdrawals — called required minimum distributions, or RMDs — or if you take too little, you will be subject to a possible 25% penalty on the amount not withdrawn. These RMDs can be sizable, and they're also taxable. But when you move money from your IRA to a qualified charitable organization — a process known as taking a qualified charitable distribution, or QCD — you can possibly satisfy your RMD requirement for that year, with the funds then being kept out of your taxable income. You don't even have to wait until you reach the RMD age because you can begin making QCDs of up to \$105,000 per year once you reach 70¹/₂. (This amount is indexed for inflation, so it may rise each year.)

And because QCDs won't add to your taxable income, you can get additional benefits. First, by taking QCDs, rather than accepting the taxable income from your IRA, you could lower your adjusted gross income (AGI), which, in turn, could help reduce the taxes on your Social Security benefits. The taxes on these benefits are based on your overall income and filing status. And second, a lower AGI can possibly reduce your Medicare Part B premiums, which are also based on your income.

Now let's look at the relationship between two other retirement accounts and QCDs:

• *Traditional* 401(k) — A traditional 401(k), like a traditional

IRA, will be subject to RMDs, but it doesn't qualify for a QCD. However, you could roll your RMDs from a 401(k) into an IRA, which would then let you use the QCD strategy. This rollover may be more beneficial to you than simply taking the distribution from your 401(k) and then donating the money to a charity, but you'll want to consult your tax professional.

• *Roth IRA* — A Roth IRA is not subject to RMDs, so you can essentially keep your IRA intact as long as you want, though you're likely to need at least some of it to help you pay for your retirement. But because Roth IRA withdrawals are tax-free (provided you've had your account at least five years and are 59½ or older before you take withdrawals), you won't get the benefit of lowering your AGI by transferring your IRA funds to a charity. Of course, you're still free to take money from your Roth IRA and donate it to charities. If you itemize on your taxes, you can deduct your charitable contributions, up to 60% of your AGI. But many people no longer itemize because of a significant increase in the standard deduction a few years ago.

If you don't need all the required withdrawals from your traditional IRA, you may find that taking a QCD is a good way to use the money. By helping a charitable group and getting tax benefits, you'll be "multitasking" in a way that benefits everybody.

NC EXTENSION Pamlico County Christmas Tree Care

Christmas trees are a holiday tradition that reminds us of past experiences and symbolizes hope for a new year. In North Carolina, Christmas trees also provide a valuable addition to our economy, with North Carolina producing 22% of all the real Christmas trees in the U.S., the second-largest producer in the U.S. From approximately 33,000 acres of Christmas trees across the state, more than a dozen

varieties are grown (Fir, Spruce, Pine, Arborvitae, etc.), with our native Fraser Fir being the most popular.

The popularity of the Fraser Fir is such that this single species represents 94% of all Christmas trees grown in North Carolina and has been recognized as one of the nation's best, along with being chosen as the official White House Christmas tree 14 times. If you purchase a Christmas tree this year, there is an

as most will leave an unsightly dark stain. The application of an insecticide is rarely needed, but insecticidal soap would be the safer option. However, insecticidal soap requires thorough coverage, which will be almost impossible once the tree is decorated. If the insect problem is significant, a return trip for a replacement tree might be needed.

So, what can we do to help protect this valuable holiday symbol and significant investment?

- 2. To prepare your Christmas tree for display, make a straight fresh cut and remove approximately one-half inch of material from the base of the tree before placing the tree in the stand.
- 3. Use a stand that will hold a gallon of water or more. Check the water level often and keep the stand full. A tree may take up a gallon of water in the first 24 hours and a quart each day after that. Preservatives are not needed, just plenty of fresh water.
- 4. Place trees away from heat sources, heating vents, fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, and sunny windows. These sources can dry out foliage and can create fire hazards.

In some rare cases, Christmas trees can bring along unwanted hitchhikers such as Cinara aphids or spider mites. These insects are rarely a problem, but can sometimes arrive in large enough numbers to create concern. Give the tree a good shake outside and rinse the tree with a garden hose. This can help dislodge pests and loose needles, and reduce dust or pollen. If you notice insect pests when the tree is displayed, use a vacuum to carefully remove them. Try to avoid smashing insects that fall from trees,

Parents of schoolaged youngsters may wonder how often children between the ages of six and 11 need to bathe. According to the American Academy of Dermatology, children between the ages of six and 11 may not require a daily bath. Though it's worth noting that such children can take daily baths, the AAD notes that children in this age group need a bath at least once or twice per

week, but beyond that bathing schedules may be contingent on a host of variables specific to each child. For example, children will need a bath after swimming in a pool, lake or ocean regardless of how long it's been since their most recent bath. In addition, children who get dirty playing or those who are sweaty or develop body odor during the day should take a bath at night. It's also noteworthy that showers can enter kids' hygiene routine around age six or seven. The American Academy of Pediatrics notes that six- or seven-year-old children are typically capable of cleaning their bodies and washing their hair by themselves in the shower.



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Health&Wellness 8 WAYS TO AVOID HOLIDAY WEIGHT GAIN



A popular, familiar holiday song insists the period between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day is "the most wonderful time of the year." But for people who are mindful of eating and trying to maintain a healthy weight, the holiday season can very well turn into the "most compromising time of the year."

Weight gain during the holiday season is guite common, although the amount gained can vary and it may not be as high as people think. According to research published in the Journal of Obesity, the average weight gain during the holidays is anywhere from 0.8 pounds to just under 2 pounds. Although that doesn't sound like a lot, that extra weight stays on, says Dr. Donald Hensrud, a Mayo Clinic physician specializing in nutrition. Cumulative holiday weight gain can add up over the years. Dr. Hensrud says studies also show that people who weigh more to begin with may also gain more weight during the holiday season.

Though the holiday season can be food-centric, it is possible to avoid gaining weight between late November and the start of a new year.

1. Eat protein in the morning. A high-protein breakfast can keep blood sugar more stable throughout the day and help control appetite. This can curb snacking as well as over-indulgence later in the day during holiday meals.

2. Keep a consistent schedule. Just because it's the holiday season doesn't mean schedules should go out the window. Stick to structured mealtimes and your usual exercise routine even amid all the celebrating.

3. Use smaller plates. It's possible to fool yourself into thinking you ate more if you fill up a small plate rather than a large one. This can keep your portion sizes more within reason.

4. Curtail the cocktails. Many people enjoy more alcoholic drinks during the holiday season than they do at other times of the year. But alcoholic beverages can be high in calories, especially mixed drinks and traditional egg nog. If you choose to drink, Columbia University Irvington Medical Center suggests sticking to clear liquors with club soda in moderation, and limiting consumption of beer, wine and mixed drinks.

5. Load up on a protein-laden snack. An hour before heading out for a holiday party or meal, enjoy a protein-rich shake or vogurt to allow for more self-control later on.

6. Eat strategically. Fill up on vegetables, whole grains and other less calorie-dense foods. Go sparingly with the foods you know are historically less healthy, including fried offerings or cream-based dishes.

7. Manage stress effectively. Although the holiday season is a festive time of year, it also can be stressful. Many people cope with stress by eating comfort foods, which can contribute to weight gain. Alleviate stress through exercise, meditation, talking with friends or a therapist, or taking other measures that do not involve food or drinks.

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8. Take the focus off food. Whenever possible, build holiday-related activities around something other than food. For example, replace family baking sessions with some homemade wreath-making.

Weight gain doesn't have to be a part of the holiday season. By being mindful of behaviors, it's possible to enjoy the season and still maintain health.

- 2 to 3 tablespoons canola oil, for frying
- cup low-fat cream cheese, softened 1
- 1 cup ricotta cheese
- small bunch dill, finely chopped, plus extra 1
- 2 to 3 tablespoons hot water, plus extra as needed
- 13/4 cups smoked salmon slices
- 1/2 lemon, juiced

1. Blend together the flour, eggs, milk, salt, butter, and dill in a food processor until smooth. Pour into a jug.

2. Heat a little oil in a non-stick frying or crepe pan set over medium heat until hot. Add a small ladle of batter to the pan and tilt with a circular motion so that the batter coats the surface evenly.

3. Cook for 1 to 2 minutes until golden underneath. Flip and cook for a further minute or so. Remove to a plate and repeat the process using a little more oil for each crepe.

4. Beat cream cheese and ricotta cheese with dill and 2 to 3 tablespoons hot water in a bowl until creamy and spreadable, adding more water as needed. Season to taste with salt. 5. Spread over cooked pancakes and top with smoked salmon slices. Drizzle with lemon juice. Roll up into cigar shapes and cut into bite-size pieces. Serve with a dill garnish.

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Pursuant to North Carolina General Statutes 105-307(a), all persons owning personal and or business property on January 1 that is subject to taxation, must list such property during the listing period of January 1 through January 31. The property can be listed from 8AM through 5PM, Monday through Friday at the Pamlico County Tax Listing Department located in the Pamlico County Courthouse.

A listing form is required if one or more of the following apply:

- You own an unregistered vehicle(s) that does not have an active North Carolina registration.
- You own other reportable personal property such as boats, boat motors, jet skis, aircraft, etc.
- You own a boat or utility trailer with permanent tags.
- You own a singlewide mobile home or a double wide mobile home without a permanent foundation.
- You own business personal property.

If you received a listing form in the previous year for listing your property, a listing form will automatically be mailed to you at the address on record as of December 31. If you do not receive a listing form and you have property that is required to be listed, it is your responsibility to obtain a listing form from the Pamlico County Tax Office.

Failure to list within the required listing period of January 1 through January 31 will result in a penalty of 10% of the total tax levied.

Real Estate in Pamlico County is permanently listed and does not require an annual listing.

• The property is your permanent residence you own and occupy. - You are 65 years or older as of January 1. - See the Listing office for more information regarding the income requirements.





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
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environment. They also explored the Neuse River's unique ecosystem, fostering curiosity and teamwork along the way.
