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

Hurricanes Bow Out in 3rd Round

The Hurricanes of Pamlico headed west to Wake Preparatory Academy for their third round game of the North Carolina High School Athletic Association's State Basketball Championship Tournament. The Guardians were seeded #4 for the tourney, while Pamlico held the #12 seed. Pamlico started strong and at the end of the first period led by 2, 15-13. Wake Prep came storming back, outscoring the 'Canes in the second quarter by 10 to go to the locker room up 32-24. You could sense that these two teams were going to battle this one out and take it down to the wire. Pamlico was having problems however as they seem to have had all season, hitting free throws. Thankfully, Wake Prep was having problems of their own at the charity strip. For the game, Pamlico shot 50% at the line, making 16 of their 32 opportunities. As mentioned, the Guardians also shot poorly, hitting only 7 of their 18 free throws

(39%). Going into the final period, Pamlico had cut Wake Prep's lead in half, 29-35. On five occasions in the final 6 minutes, Pamlico pulled to within on point and held possession of the ball, but could never take the lead. Whether it was a turnover, missed shot, or missed free throw, they could never get over the hump. The final opportunity came with :36 seconds left and the Guardians up, 52-51, and Pamlico at the free throw line with two shots. Both were missed. Wake Prep promptly scored and Pamlico could feel the opportunity to advance slip away. Final score, 56-51, Wake Prep. Pamlico was led by Sydney Whitley-Reese who scored 29 points and pulled down 17 rebounds in the losing effort. A disappointment, but still much to be proud of, and much to look forward to, for this Hurricane team. They finish the season 23-6 and will only graduate one Senior, Samyiah Maiden, off their roster.

LANDSCAPE LIGHTING has become increasingly popular in recent years. Such lighting can extend living spaces, and many homeowners report that a well-lit landscape helps them feel more safe at home. Though the final cost to light up a home's exterior will depend on the size of a property, landscape lighting is among the more budget-friendly home renovations homeowners can consider. According to the renovation experts at Angi.com, the average cost of a landscape



lighting project is \$4,000. Considering how much landscape lighting transforms the look of a property at night, that's a lot of bang for homeowners' bucks. Solar lights are popular, but homeowners may want to consider electrical wiring that ensures lights maintain their awe-inspiring glow throughout the night. Electrical work requires additional labor, and thus a higher price tag. However, Angi notes that modern LED bulbs consume just 25 percent of the energy used by incandescent alternatives, which can make them a more reliable option than self-installed solar lights.






New Bern Breakfast Rotary Club Announces the 14th Annual B/S/H/Oktoberfest

There will be a SUPPORT UKRAINE RALLY on Friday, March 14 from 4-6 at the Courthouse on the HWY 55 side.

We call upon you to join with us and the majority of American Citizens in support of the people of Ukraine.

In 1994 the Budapest Memorandum was signed by the U.S., France, UK, Ukraine and Russia. As part of this agreement Ukraine gave up one of the largest nuclear arsenals in the world in exchange for secure border guarantees. Nevertheless, in 2014 Russia annexed Ukraine's Crimea. The Ukrainian government forces fought the Russian-backed separatists. Then in 2022 Russia launched a full scale invasion of Ukraine. The larger, stronger Russian military was expected to win in three days. Three years later the Ukrainians are still heroically defending their country with the support of the U.S., France, the UK and most European countries.

Senator Tillis (R-NC) recently visited Ukraine and made a video about his trip (https://www. cnn.com/2025/02/20/politics/video/gop-senator-tillis-trump-putin-cancer-speech-senatefloor-digvid). In it he states that Putin is the greatest threat to democracy in his lifetime. Let's join Tillis and voice our support for President Zelensky and the Ukrainian people.

Watch out for tax scams



It's tax season again — which also means, unfortunately, that it's time for the annual array of scams aimed at taxpayers. Fortunately, by being alert, you can protect yourself from these attempts to defraud you.

Your first line of defense is to recognize the warning signs of potential tax scams. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) cites these common red

- Promises of big payments If you've filed taxes for many years, either by yourself or with the help of a tax professional, you probably have a pretty good idea of whether you're getting a refund, and how much it will be. But scammers, often using social media, may promise huge refunds by essentially encouraging you to claim tax credits to which you're not entitled and then charging large, upfront fees or a fee based on your refund amount.
- Suspicious websites Watch out for strange-sounding or misspelled web links — these can take you to harmful sites, rather than the official site of the IRS (IRS.gov).
- Solicitations from charity imposters The many natural disasters we've experienced in recent years has brought out great support from people wanting to help friends, neighbors and even total strangers. However, these catastrophes have also encouraged scammers who solicit contributions to bogus charitable groups. To determine whether an organization is a qualified charity that can receive tax-deductible contributions, visit the Tax Exempt Organization Search tool on IRS.gov.
- Threats or demands IRS impersonators may threaten you with large fines, or even arrest, if you don't make immediate payments of what they claim you owe.

You can protect yourself from many tax-related scams by knowing how the IRS will or won't communicate with you. Typically, the IRS will initiate contact with you through regular mail delivered by the U.S. Postal Service. You can verify the legitimacy of any letter by visiting your secure IRS online account, under the "Notices and Letters" section.

Other ways the IRS will contact you:

- Email Only with your permission, with a few exceptions, such as criminal investigations
- Text Only with your permission
- Phone Only to discuss your case, verify information or set up a meeting
- Fax Only to verify or request employment information
- In-person visit Rarely done, and typically only following a letter

The IRS will not:

- Contact you or take payment on social media.
- Accept gift cards or prepaid debit cards as payment.
- Threaten to call law enforcement or immigration officials. • Take your citizenship status, driver's license or business license.
- Leave pre-recorded voicemails (robocalls).
- Mail tax debt resolution advertisements.

If you have doubts about any offers or communications, whether supposedly from the IRS or not, you may want to contact a trusted, qualified tax professional.

Also, be on guard for your elderly family members, as senior citizens are frequent targets of scammers. If you talk to these family members regularly, see if you can find out about any unusual offers or solicitations they may have received.

Finally, if you believe you are a victim of monetary or identity theft, you can report these issues using the IRS website at IdentityTheft.gov. You can also refer to IRS Publication 5027 — l Identity Theft Information for Taxpayers.

Tax scams and identity theft are serious threats — so do whatever you can to defend yourself.

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
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

Raising sheep, goats, and pigs; building rudimentary circuits; learning to sew, completing service projects, gaining leadership skills, and learning about cooking and nutrition. Many of these learning opportunities were the foundations of life skills I'm still utilizing today. Perhaps none more so than the

cooking and nutrition education. The effects of healthy eating are impactful in so many ways. Good nutrition is tied to supporting

and maintaining muscles; boosting immunity; strengthening bones; lowering the risk of heart disease, type 2 diabetes, and some cancers; helps support digestive system function; as well as maintaining a healthy weight. These benefits significantly impact long term health and quality of life.

We are happy for youth to have the opportunity to learn about good nutrition, develop safe food preparation practices, and learn about the world. Chopped! International is a 4-H Spin club meeting the fourth Tuesday of the month at the Craven County Cooperative Extension Office. Last year we learned about Thailand, and created a Thai Curry then we learned about Portugal, and made Peri Peri chicken and a Portuguese style salad. Last month we learned about Italy and made three kinds of pasta (Pasta Pomodoro, Pasta de Lenticchi, and Spaghetti Bolognese). This month we will doing breakfast around the world. We will explore several countries and make breakfast foods from around the world.

How parents can help kids overcome shyness

Parents typically discover if their children are outgoing or introverted around the time the child is three or four. Kids who stay on the sidelines at parties or hug tightly to their mom or dad's legs may be shy.

Even though shyness isn't a bad thing and introverted children have wonderful qualities to contribute to the world, being overly shy can prevent kids from having their voices heard — espe-

cially if they are being bullied or someone has violated boundaries. Parents can help shy children come out of their shells with a few simple strategies.

- Discuss new places and people. Prepare children for new situations, which can be overwhelming for children who are shy. Talk about what is expected in a new classroom, moving to a bigger school or even a family party with a lot of people in attendance. Touring a place in advance can make it more familiar to a shy child, helping him or her feel less anxious.
- Buddy up with other shy kids. Parents of shy children can seek out others in similar situations. A friend to hang around with in new situations can make it much easier, as these two children can rely on one another.
- Try not to label the behavior. It's one thing for you to understand your child is shy, but sharing that classification with others could lead to unwanted labeling that further



exacerbates the problem. A child who constantly hears he or she is shy may not make an effort to change his or her behaviors.

• Empathize with your child. Give examples of when you were feeling shy in certain situations. Explain the emotions and how you overcame them with time, suggests the Children's Hospital of Los Angeles.

Model confident behavior. Whenever you can, be

outgoing in front of your children when meeting new teachers or other children's parents for the first time.

- Provide opportunities for children to express their feelings. Whether children can voice their feelings or can express themselves through pretend play or artistic endeavors, Corner's One Learning Center suggests making it safe and comfortable for kids to share with you.
- Offer praise as often as you can. When a child acts bravely, tell him or her about how proud you were when you get home or to a private place. Doing so in private may help the child feel more comfortable and less embarrassed.
- Speak of different clubs or activities. Suggest your child participate in various group activities so that interests are explored and new friends can be made.

Shyness is something many children grow out of over time. In the interim, parents can provide support.





Potato bread for Patty's Day

St. Patrick's Day might be more widely associated with pints of Guinness than Irish cuisine, but that does not mean revelers cannot indulge in some tasty food this March 17th. Those with a day of celebration ahead may want to start their day off with this recipe for "Irish Potato Bread" from Linda Collister's "Quick Breads" (Ryland, Peters & Small). The bread can be served alongside a pile of bacon and just-cooked eggs to make for a delicious, hearty breakfast.



- 13/4 cups smooth mashed potatoes (1 very large cooked potato or 2 medium)
- 3/4 cup self-rising flour
- 1/4 teaspoon powdered mustard
- teaspoon sea salt 1/2
- Several grinds of black pepper
- tablespoon snipped chives or 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- extra-large egg, beaten Butter for frying

Mix the mashed potatoes with the flour, mustard, salt, pepper, and herbs. Do this with a wooden spoon, not a food processor (otherwise, you'll get a gluey mess).

Work in the beaten egg to make a firm dough. If it is very soft and sticky, work in a little more flour. Turn out the dough onto a floured work surface, flour your hands, then knead the dough once or twice to make a smooth ball. Divide the dough into 8 equal portions and shape each one into a small cake, about 21/2 inches across.

When ready to cook, heat a little butter in a large heavy skillet, preferably nonstick, and cook the breads over medium heat for about 7 minutes on each side, until they turn good golden brown and are slightly puffed. Serve immediately.

1970s "Harvey Wallbanger"



According to author W. Park Kerr, one story suggests the classic 1970s drink "Harvey Wallbanger" was inspired by a California surfer who had a few too many one night. Kerr's book, "Viva Vodka" (Chronicle Books), relays the tale even further. Those who want to try this possibly Californian-inspired concoction will need 11/2 ounces good-quality vodka, 4 to 5 ounces fresh orange juice and 1/2 ounce Galliano. In a cocktail shaker, shake the vodka and orange juice vigorously with ice. Strain into an icefilled highball glass, and float the Galliano on top.



Understanding colorectal cancer



No one is immune to cancer. People of all ages and from all walks of life can be diagnosed with cancer, though it's important to recognize the tireless efforts of researchers whose work has done much to improve survival rates for an assortment of cancers. The work of cancer researchers includes efforts to find treatments but also to learn about the disease, including its risk factors. Identifying the risk factors for certain cancers, including colorectal cancer, can help medical professionals as they advise patients on the best ways to reduce their risk for this deadly, yet often preventable disease.

The World Cancer Research Fund notes that colorectal cancer is the second most commonly occurring cancer in women and the third most commonly occurring cancer in men. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, colorectal cancer is the second leading cancer killer in the United States. Estimates from the Canadian Cancer Society predicted that 9,400 Canadians would lose their lives to colorectal cancer in 2024, representing 11 percent of all cancer deaths in the country.

What is colorectal cancer?

Sometimes referred to as colon cancer, colorectal cancer is cancer that occurs in the colon or rectum. The CDC notes that abnormal growths called polyps sometimes form in the colon or rectum, and these polyps may grow into cancer.

Why is screening so important?

Screening for colorectal cancer is so important because it can find polyps and give doctors a chance to remove them before they turn into cancer.

What are the risk factors for colorectal cancer?

Age is a significant risk factor for colorectal cancer, as the CDC notes that roughly 90 percent of cases occur in men and women who are 50 or older. In addition to age, a family history of colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps increases a person's risk for the disease. Inflammatory bowel diseases like Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis also can increase a person's risk of developing colorectal cancer.

Those factors may be beyond individuals' control, but the good news is that there is strong evidence that doing certain things can decrease the risk of colorectal cancer. According to the WCRF, researchers have linked these behaviors with a decreased risk of colorectal cancer:

- being physically active
- consuming whole grains
- consuming foods that contain dietary fiber
- consuming dairy products

It's important to recognize that the inverse of these behaviors (i.e., living a sedentary lifestyle, not consuming enough whole grains, etc.) can increase a person's risk of colorectal cancer.

The WCRF notes that consuming red meat, consuming processed meat, consuming alcohol, being overweight or obese, and being tall have been linked to an elevated risk of colorectal cancer.

When to consider screening

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force recommends that adults between the ages of 50 and 75 should be screened for colorectal cancer. Adults with a family history of the disease or those with an inflammatory bowel disease may need to be tested prior to turning 50.

Colorectal cancer is a significant threat, particularly for adults over 50. Adults must recognize that threat and discuss it with their physicians to reduce their risk for this often preventable disease.

The Brickyard Cemetery Cleanup

Over twenty volunteers came out last Saturday for the annual Brickyard Cemetery cleanup day in Hobucken. Many of the volunteers are descendants of some of the permanent residents of the cemetery which dates back to the 1800's and possibly even earlier when the area was known as "The Marshes Community." The cemetery is named the Brickyard Cemetery because it was along the old Brickyard Road, which appropriately enough led to the community brick yard and kiln. The cleanup day also brought out friends and neighbors of those descendants to lend a hand. Cousins William "Diddle" Ireland and Samuel Swindell have been doing this nearly every year since 2014. Originally, they were going to just cleanup up the gravesite of their Great Grandfather, Confederate Civil War Veteran Samuel Swindell and his wife, Suckey. "After we got started, we figured we'd go ahead and clean up what we could of the rest of it," said Ireland. At that time there were only a few graves marked with headstones. Most had only badly deteriorated wooden crosses as markers. "One year after a cleanup, we counted what we believe are 42 graves," said Ireland. "Most of the old wooden cross markers have deteriorated away, but we have tried to replace them with some metal ones as well as with some paving stones. There are probably more gravesites outside the main area of the cemetery. We really don't know just how many there are." It is hard work, but also a time of remembrance and story-telling. Swindell, shared that his namesake, Samuel, was wounded in battle in Virginia and captured by the Union. He was taken to a prisoner of war camp in Maryland and when he was paroled at the end of the war, he walked back home to Hobucken. "He (Samuel) and my Great Grandmother are buried on top of one another in the same grave," said Sammy. "I've also heard tell that she was a witch, but I don't know that for sure." Another one of the graves fortu-

nate enough to have a headstone is that of Marta Hopkins. "They say all her children are buried around her," said Swindel. I've heard there could be 7, or as many as 11 she had that died and are buried in that corner of the cemetery." The cemetery stands as a testament to the early settlers of this community and hopefully that are not Saturday at the clean-

forgotten. Some of those working Saturday at the cleanup represent more generations of descendants becoming involved, with Great-Great-Great Grandchildren of Samuel and Suckey taking over the raking and trimming. "It's good to see," said Ireland, "Somebody will have to maintain this when us old folks like me and Sammy are gone."

THe house was built around 1837 by Mr. Cornelius Dixon. He was a large producer of turpentine, lumber, and wood shingles. He used Broad Creek to move most of his goods. It is said that the landing once was behind the plantation. It consisted of about 1,200 acres. The house was from the Antebellum period or that it existed before the civil war era.

Most of us familiar with this area knew this property as the Reel property as they were the last to really utilize this proper-



Guests will be greeted by re-enactors from the 5th, 7th and 26th North Carolina Regiments, the 35th US Colored Troops, and artillery troops. The newly enlisted recruits participate in practice drills, Civil War period camp activities, crafts, and games. Adults and teens will enjoy living history presentations and a walking tour of the battlefield. The afternoon's activities will conclude with an exciting mock battle reenactment that includes the children, a live fire canon demonstration and delicious hot apple crisp. The young recruits will "muster out" and receive their pay for their service.

Displays and demonstrations will include Civil War-era medical displays, hand-carved toys and period games, military camp life display, historic equipment and tool displays, demonstration on making pine pitch and tar, make your own "True Tar Heel" certificate, Cavalry horse display, a telegraph demonstration from the New Bern Amateur Radio Club, and the Library TechMobile with historical resources and free wifi.

New Bern Battlefield Park is located off Hwy 70 at the entrance to the Taberna subdivision at 300 Battlefield Trail.


