Attorney General Jeff Jackson Warns **North Carolinians** about DMV

Text Scams



RALEIGH - Attorney General Jeff Jackson is warning North Carolinians to be on the lookout for text scams impersonating the North Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles (NCDMV) and demanding that people pay an outstanding traffic ticket or face severe actions. The Department of Justice is receiving a higher volume of calls and complaints from consumers about this scam.

"Unfortunately, scammers took note of the toll text scams that were everywhere a couple months ago and are now using the same playbook for these traffic text scams," said Attorney General Jeff Jackson. "Please keep an eye out and warn your loved ones that these texts are scams. Government agencies will never text you to threaten legal action."

These scams are targeting residents in multiple states and warn that if the recipient does not click on a link to make a payment, they may face suspended driving privileges, suspended vehicle registration, or ultimately be prosecuted.

The NCDMV will never text you to ask for payment.

If you receive one of these scam texts:

- 1. Do not click on any links.
- 2. Forward the text to 7726 (SPAM). 3. Block or delete the number.
- 4. Report it to the Federal Trade Commission at www.reportfraud. ftc.gov and the North Carolina Department of Justice at www. ncdoj.gov/complaint.

If you're unsure whether an email, text, or letter from the NCDMV is legitimate, you should contact the agency directly at (919) 715-7000.

Economics Over Emotion - Snowden School to Close

With a 6 to 3 vote, the Beaufort County Board of Education made the decision to close S.W. Snowden School in Aurora at their regular meeting last Tuesday evening in Washington. Closure of the K through 8 facility had been under speculation and debate for several years, but this spring the possibility of closing the school became more of a reality, with a continuing decline in enrollment as well as once again tight funding for education from both the state and county. The most

recent enrollment at S.W. Snowden shows 119 students across all grade levels. Students and parents in the Aurora area must now make a choice to continue to attend school in Beaufort County by traveling to Chocowinity, or seek educational opportunities elsewhere. Pamlico County Schools may be an option for some. In order to attend a public school in a county which you are not a resident in, a student must obtain a release from their current school district and make an application to attend as an out of district student. The guidelines and more information for this procedure are located on the Pamlico County Schools website



under home > resources > for families > out of district students. You can also contact the Pamlico County Schools Central office directly for more information by calling (252) 745-4171 ext. 6643. As Pamlico County School Superintendent Dr. Jeremy Johnson states, "We make every effort to accommodate out of district students who meet the enrollment criteria, but our first obligation is to students who live in Pamlico County and reside within our school district." It should

be noted that there is a deadline for this application and that deadline is fast approaching, June 19, 2025. Arapahoe Charter School is another option for former Snowden students. According to statistics provided by the Beaufort County Board of Education, there are already roughly 40 students that would be in Snowden's school district, attending ACS. Arapahoe Charter School can be contacted at (252) 249-2599. The closure of Snowden School is one more blow to the small community of Aurora that in recent years has seen their grocery store close as well as their only bank earlier this spring.



Former PCI offender participates in Commencement



Harvey Rountree, center, was among the members of the Pamlico Community College Class of 2025 who participated in the college's Commencement ceremony May 16. What made his situation unusual was he completed the requirements for his associate degree in Human Services Technology (HST) while he was housed at Pamlico Correctional Institution in Bayboro. Rountree, who was released from state custody April 30, was the first PCI student to participate in an on-campus Commencement. Rountree entered the HST program in the Fall of 2022 at PCI. He was a student of Instructor George Royal II. The college launched the innovative HST program at the Bayboro prison in August 2017. It's designed to reduce recidivism among participants by teaching life skills such as anger management, avoiding substance abuse, maintaining family relationships and other material. She was named in Rissi Palmer's Color Me Country Class of 2021 and featured in a PBS NewsHour special on Black women in country music. In 2022, Julie joined the Black Opry, a collective of Black artists in country, blues, folk, and Americana music that have been featured on the Kelly Clarkson Show, Good Morning America, and NPR Music. Julie was inducted in the CMT Next Women of Country Class of 2023, joining celebrities Kacey Musgraves, Lainey Wilson,



Lauren Alaina, and Maren Morris, among others.





Observe Save for Education Day with a 529 plan



Whether your children are in grade school or high school, they'll be leaving for college or trade school before you know it. With the cost of education rising, now is the time to prepare for that day.

an Environmental Assessment (EA) for proposed airport improvements at the Coastal Carolina Regional Airport (EWN) in Craven County, North Carolina. The EA being prepared will also meet the NEPA requirements of the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT). The proposed improvements include construction of a 173-foot runway extension and 400-foot runway safety area extension, relocation of a portion of Williams Road, minimal property and easement acquisition, piping of portions of Scotts Creek, and relocation of navigational aids. The proposed project is needed to improve airfield safety and maximize the usable runway length available to existing operators at EWN.

Consultants, acting on the behalf of EWN, have prepared an EA describing the anticipated environmental impacts. Based on the thresholds established in FAA Order 1050.1F, no resources would be significantly impacted by the No-action Alternative or the Proposed Action. The Proposed Action would not result in an increase in the number of annual aircraft operations at EWN in comparison to the No-action Alternative. The draft EA can be reviewed at: flyewn.com/business/draft-ea. A printed copy of the Draft EA is also available for review during regular business hours at the EWN Administration Offices, 200 Terminal Drive, New Bern, NC 28562.

Public Meeting – A public meeting will be conducted on June 24, 2025, from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM to discuss the project with the Project Team and solicit public review and comment on the Draft Environmental Assessment. The in-person meeting will be a drop-in format with no formal presentation, held in the Cstone (Cornerstone) Church gymnasium, 2304 US-70, New Bern, NC 28560.
