Sweet Megg is a versatile vocalist and songwriter known for weaving jazz, country, and blues into an Americana sound that feels both timeless and fresh. Originally from NYC and now based in Nashville, she has traveled the world honing her craft from Parisian jazz clubs to Southern honky-tonks. Drawing inspiration from legendary artists such as Billie Holiday, Patsy Cline and Bessie Smith, she aims to create a timeless sound with a modern edge, emphasizing improvisation and emotional storytelling.

Megg appears with a band that can range from 2 to 8 people who play it all, full on 1920s New Orleans style, 1930s swing, straight-ahead jazz, honky-tonky tonk and rock 'n' roll. Her last studio album, "Never Been Home" reached #23 on the Americana charts and #1 on the Alt-Country Radio charts. Sweet Megg has toured globally with Postmodern Jukebox and led a Cirque du Soleil country music project, further expanding her artistic reach.

State's ban on open burning lifted for 81 North Carolina counties as conditions improve with recent rain

RALEIGH – The N.C. Forest Service has lifted a ban on all open burning for 81 counties effective 8 a.m. Sunday, May 3. The statewide ban on open burning went into effect March 28 due to hazardous forest fire conditions, and the ban remains in effect for Alamance, Anson, Cabarrus, Chatham, Davidson, Davie, Forsyth, Gaston, Guilford, Iredell, Mecklenburg, Montgomery, Moore, Randolph, Rockingham, Rowan, Stanly, Stokes and Union counties until further notice.

“The recent rainfall has provided some relief and has moderated fire danger enough for us to lift the ban on open burning in 81 counties,” said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. “However, we’re still in the thick of spring wildfire season when conditions can change quickly and frequently. We still need rain to move us forward with drought recovery, improving soil moisture and water levels. Be extremely vigilant with any outdoor burning if you’re in one of the 81 counties no longer under the state-issued ban. Make sure you have a valid burn permit, tools and a water source, and stay with your fire. If you’re in one of the 19 counties still under the state-issued burn ban, be patient and hold off on burning. We need more rain in your area to lift the ban. With the persistent drought, it’s important

for all of us to use extreme caution when handling potential ignition sources such as machinery and motorized equipment. When in doubt, lean on your N.C. Forest Service county ranger’s office for guidance and best practices.”

The lifting of the burn ban in 81 counties does not apply to fires started within 100 feet of an occupied dwelling. The local fire marshal has authority to issue or lift a burn ban within those 100 feet.

As of 8 a.m. Sunday, May 3, burn permits are available in the counties no longer under the state’s ban on open burning. Residents in those counties can obtain a burn permit from any authorized permitting agent or online at <https://apps.ncagr.gov/burnpermits/>. All burn permits granted before the statewide burn ban were canceled when the ban became effective. To legally burn in the counties no longer under the state’s ban, a valid permit must be obtained.

Residents with questions regarding their specific county can contact their local N.C. Forest Service county ranger or county fire marshal’s office. To find contact information for your local NCFs county ranger, visit www.ncforestservice.gov/contacts.

Four estate planning myths that could cost your family

Consider this scenario: A teacher of 30 years and mother of three passes away at age 58. She leaves behind a modest home, a retirement account and cherished family heirlooms – but no estate plan. Her children, still grieving, find themselves navigating a confusing probate process, disagreeing about when to sell the house and considering who gets their grandmother’s ring.

This mom wasn’t wealthy by most measures, but her lack of planning created confusion, conflict and uncertainty at a time when her family needed clarity. Her story reminds us of an important truth: estate planning is about easing conflict and making sure what you have goes where you want it to go.

As you think about your own legacy, consider these myths that can lead to costly mistakes and unintended outcomes.

Myth 1: Estate planning is only for wealthy people. The desire to make things easier for loved ones has nothing to do with net worth. Formally documenting your wishes reduces the burden on family members and gives you control. Without a plan, your state’s laws will decide how your estate is handled, and you may not like what those laws say.

Myth 2: Having a will is all you need. While a will is important, it only takes effect after death. That means it offers no protection if you become incapacitated and cannot make decisions for yourself. It does, however, allow you to name legal guardians for dependent children.

The foundation of most estate plans includes a will (which directs asset distribution), a financial power of attorney (for financial decisions), a health care power of attorney (for medical decisions), and a medical directive (to share your end of life wishes). While not everyone needs a trust, there are several that allow you to make special provisions, such as for minor children, a special needs family member or even a cherished pet. Consulting with a financial advisor and an estate planning attorney can help determine the right combination based on your situation.

Myth 3: Equal distribution is always fair. It’s likely that the individuals in your estate plan, especially if they are adult children, have different family and financial situations. You may have one child who’s extremely successful financially while another is struggling. Or you may have assets, such as a house or ownership of a family business, that are more suitable for one beneficiary than another. It’s important to consider any unique circumstances as you develop your estate plan.

Myth 4: I can set it and forget it. You’ll want to review your estate plan every few years or when a major life event occurs. Life is full of changes, such as marriages, divorces, new children and relocations, and they will likely impact your goals. Reviewing your plan helps keep everything aligned with your wishes and serves as a reminder to keep your beneficiaries on all your assets up to date.

Ultimately, estate planning is about helping ensure your voice is heard and your loved ones cared for, no matter what the future holds.

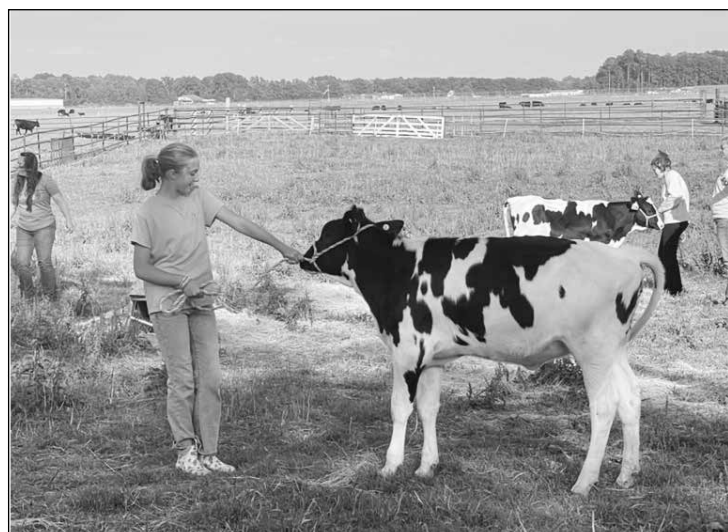
What’s Been Happening with Pamlico County 4-HC

When I talk about 4-H I often point out how 4-H has grown since it’s inception in 1909. 4-H in North Carolina started with Corn Clubs and it has grown to public speaking competitions, computer programming, and digital literacy programs. All of these programs are both fun and impactful. However, that does not mean that there is no place in 4-H programming for what many people view as the traditional 4-H programs.

Connecting youth to agriculture, food systems, and allowing them to develop important skills in nutrition, food safety and cooking are still important for youth and fun. This spring we have had so much fun engaging in several agricultural and life skill focused programs. This week we had our final practice for the Coastal Plains Chicken Show, began refining our show techniques for the Dairy Show, explored Hungarian Cuisine, and started our summer crops for our school garden.



The Coastal Plains Chicken Project is an awesome opportunity for youth to explore poultry science. We began our project in early February when our chicks arrived. Our 4-Hers raised their chicks learning how to properly care for them, and documenting their journey. Over the last two months they have also been learning how to show their chickens. Showing chickens requires 4-Hers to learn different parts of the chicken. Then they must work with their chicken so they can show off those parts of the chicken. We are very excited to see all of our 4-Her’s hard work pay off!

We are also half way through our second 4-H Dairy Project. Our dairy project allows Pamlico youth the opportunity to connect to large animal agriculture whether or not they have the space to house an animal. All of our calves for the Dairy project are generously loaned from Kooba farms and housed at a local producer’s pasture. During the course of the Dairy Project our 4-Hers are learning about dairy cattle and their appropriate care. They are also learning how to show dairy calves.

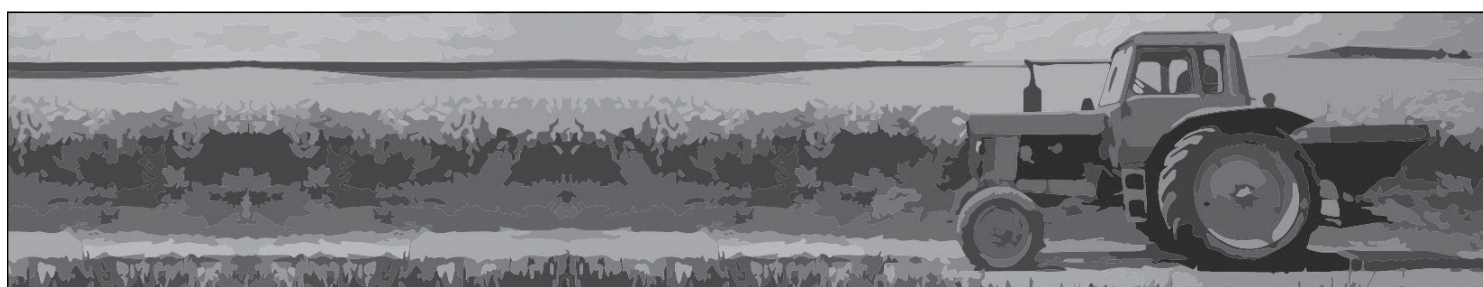


Our Chopped International program has been exploring food safety, cooking skills, and international cuisine. This month we journeyed to Hungary. We learned where Hungary is and made three traditional recipes: csirkepaprikas, Hungarian style green beans, and retes. We worked on our knife skills, cooking hygiene, and the proper temperature to cook meat too. We have one more Chopped International before we take a break for summer programs!



We have also been connecting agriculture to the food we eat this year in our Ag 101 class at Pamlico County Christian Academy. Over the past few weeks we’ve been harvesting our spring crops of radishes and peas, and will be harvesting arugula, swiss chard, red leaf lettuce, butter crunch lettuce, and turnips. This week we started our summer crops tomatoes, peppers, carrots, basil, thyme, sage, cucumbers, squash, kale, celery, corn, onions, watermelons, honeydew, and jubilee. We are excited for our 4-Hers to have the opportunity to come out and work in the gardens over the summer.

This one was a little tighter, but the Hurricanes scored three in the fifth and three more in the sixth to wrap up an 8-1 victory. McLamb and Mitchell shared pitching duties with Mitchell getting the win, allowing only one run in four innings of work. Ayden Broughton had a double and a triple at the plate to go along with a walk, scoring three times for the Hurricanes. Pamlico finishes up the regular season with a 13-10 overall record but are 7-3 in conference action, putting them in second place. Seedings for the state championship tournament come out this Monday, and playoffs start the following day.

Thursday the Hurricanes traveled to Lejeune to wrap up their regular season and Pamlico was dominant, getting 19 hits and scoring in every inning in a 15-3 win. Lots of Hurricanes were hot at the plate. Kylee Morris went 4 for 4 including a pair of doubles while driving in three runs and scoring twice herself. Payton Force had three hits with a home run and a pair of triples while driving in three and scoring three runs. Sarah Scott had a 3-3-3 night; 3 hits, 3 runs, and 3 RBI's. Pamlico finishes up the regular season with an overall record of 9-13 but a good conference mark of 6-4, solidly in Third place. The state tournament starts this Tuesday.

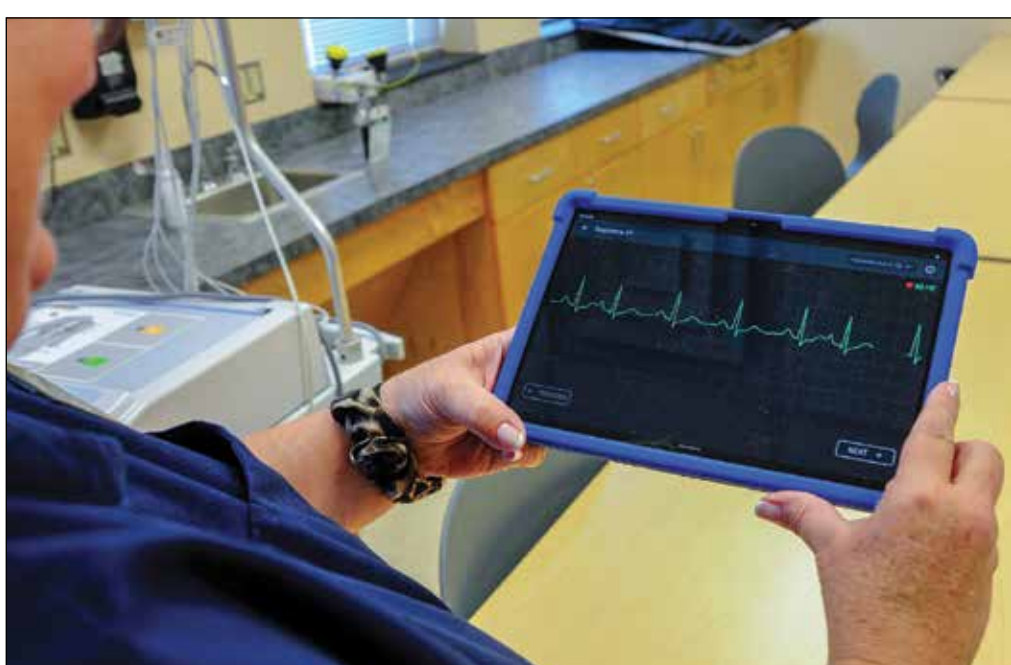

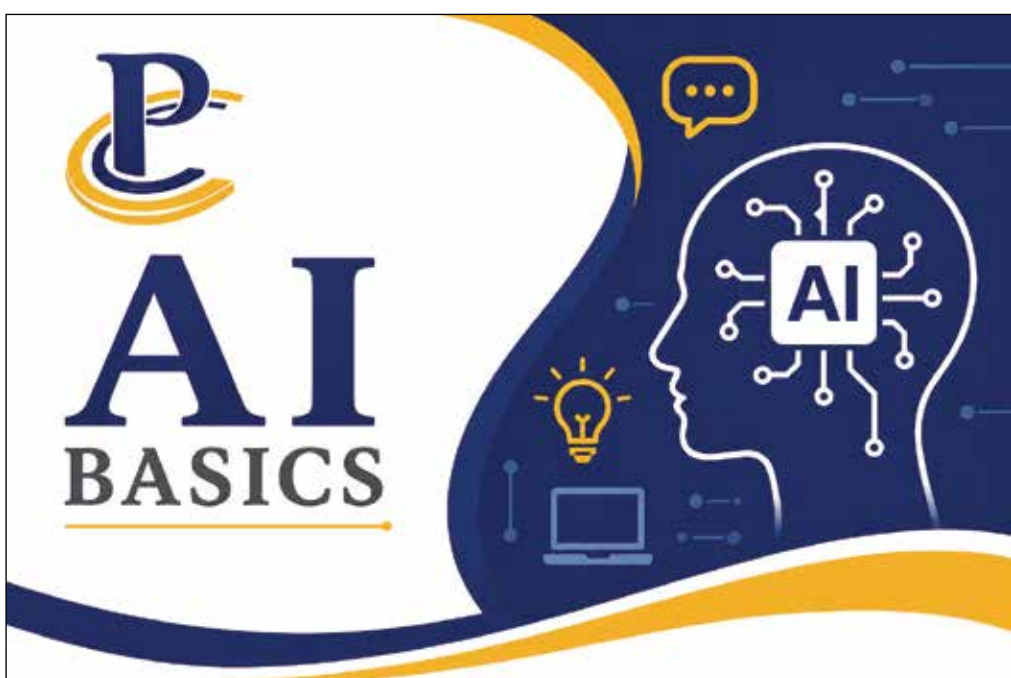

For example, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates that employment of registered nurses will grow by 6 percent between 2022 and 2032. That growth rate exceeds the average expected rate for all occupations. Whether individuals want to become a nurse or gain a greater understanding of the many ways nurses contribute each day, this rundown of the various types of nurses can shed light on these unsung heroes of the medical community.

- **Pediatric nurse:** Pediatric nurses make a strong impression because they are the first nursing professionals many people recall interacting with, and those interactions may last from early childhood through adolescence. Pediatric nurses perform a range of tasks, including the administration of medication; monitoring of vitals like temperature, pulse and blood pressure; health evaluations to identify symptoms; and even speak with parents to calm any nerves or anxieties they may have. Pediatric nurses typically work in doctor's offices or hospital settings.
- **Geriatric nurse:** Geriatric nurses figure to be in especially high demand in the coming years, as an analysis from the Bipartisan Policy Center indicates more than four million individuals in the United States will turn 65 in 2024. AARP has characterized that surge in the over-65 population as a "silver tsunami," and geriatric nurses will play pivotal roles in ensuring the aging population gets the care it needs in the decades to come.
- **Family nurse practitioner:** The American Association of Nurse Practitioners® notes family nurse practitioners (FNPs) provide a wide range of family-focused health care services to patients of all ages. FNPs perform physical exams; order or perform diagnostic tests; prescribe medications; develop treatment plans; and treat acute and chronic illnesses. If that sounds like a role played by physicians, it's not far off, making this among the most challenging jobs within the nursing profession.
- **Emergency room nurse:** Individuals who think a fast-paced work environment is for them may want to consider a career as an emergency room nurse. ER nurses treat patients of all ages from all walks of life. No two emergency room patients are the same, so ER nurses will rarely, if ever, have the same day on the job more than once. Accurate assessment skills are vital for ER nurses, who also must be skilled communicators, as emergency room patients are often in distress.

Nursing is an expansive profession with a host of opportunities for aspiring professionals who want to work in the medical community.

nursing shortage

A nursing shortage in the United States is expected to intensify in the coming years as the aging population grows and the need for health care increases as well. Projections from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics suggest there will be more than 203,000 openings for registered nurses each year between 2021 and 2031. And it's not just a shortage of RNs that the health care industry will be forced to confront. The BLS' Occupation Outlook Handbook also projects a growing demand for advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs), with estimates suggesting as many as 30,200 APRN openings each year between now and 2031. Qualifications to become an APRN typically include completion of a master's or even doctoral program, while RNs typically must complete a four-year bachelor's or two-year associate's program.

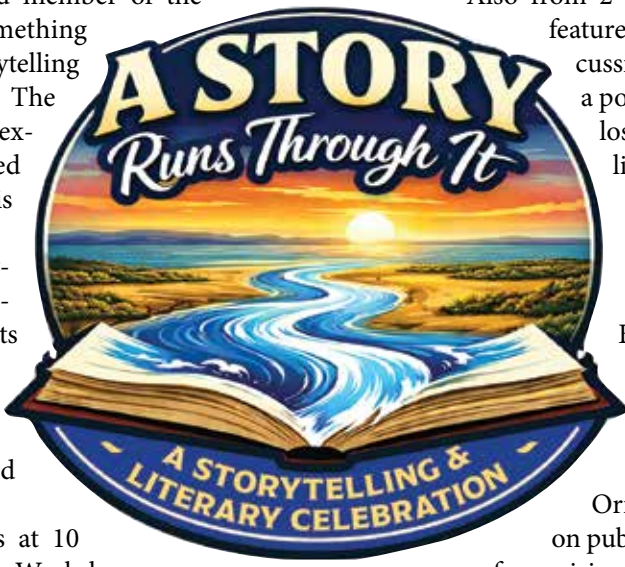
Also at 10 a.m., the Pamlico Public Library hosts a T-Rex Dino Party for children—because even the littlest storytellers deserve a roaring good time.

North Carolina recreational Red Snapper season will open for 62 days

MOREHEAD CITY – The recreational Red Snapper season will open for 62 days this summer for anglers willing to participate in a pilot project to test a data collection program that will use a mobile application to monitor the recreational Red Snapper season.

The North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality's Division of Marine Fisheries is one of four Southeastern states that received a Red Snapper Exempted Fishing Permit (EFP) from National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Fisheries to explore whether states can collect near real-time data to monitor the Red Snapper fishery. This initiative is supported by a \$300,000 grant from Yamaha Rightwaters, a conservation program from Yamaha Motors focused on sustaining marine resources and recreational fishing opportunities.

Anglers participating in the pilot project will be required to have a copy of the EFP with them. To participate and receive a copy, private recreational anglers must download the VESL mobile application and agree to record their Red Snapper harvest and discard information.

Charter and headboat owners/operators must fill out an online request form to receive a copy of the EFP. Those captains must agree to continue to report their Red Snapper harvest and discards through the NOAA reporting system they already use.

2026 North Carolina Red Snapper Season Information

Dates: July 1 – Aug. 31

Gear: Recreational hook and line only

Size limit: None

Bag limits:

Private Recreational – 1 fish per person or 4 fish per vessel (whichever is more restrictive)

Charter Boat (up to 6 passengers) – 1 fish per person or 4 fish per vessel (whichever is more restrictive)

Headboat (Greater than 6 passengers) – 1 fish per person or 20 fish per vessel (whichever is more restrictive)

This project does not impact commercial Red Snapper management.
